VISITOR TELLS OF THIS CITY

Managing Editor of Vancouver Province Gives Lightning Review for His Paper.

Roy Brown, managing editor of the Vancouver Daily Province, was in the party of visitors from Vancouver last week. This is how he saw things here:

"It was not without some regret that Vancouver visitors left Prince Rupert Wednesday night after two very enjoyable days in the neighborhood of the north coast metropolis. There is not a vacant house in Prince Rupert, while a dozen new stores have been erected this year, and the streets are lively. In fact the whole north country is enjoying almost a boom. Stewart's mining prospects seem to be more than realizing expectations, and every boat to this and other smaller camps is crowded with argonauts and piled high with outfits that brought back memories of early Klondyke days to some of the Vancouver visitors. Notable successes, too, are being made in great industrial projects, and talk of new and extensive development and of plans for fresh pulp plants and new smelters and factories are on men's tongues. Everyone who tries to size up the situation finds his blood tingling with the prospect of fortunes to be wrested from these northern resources of mines, forests, and fisheries.

A Fish Feast.

"Speaking of fisheries the Prince Rupert Board of Trade Saturday evening entertained the Vancouver crowd at a fish banquet. T. H. Johnson, who packs them by millions of pounds and ships them by the trainload, directed the cooks. There were salmon and halibut and skates and flounders, and sundry flat fish and crabs, and nearly every other thing that swims in the ocean or walks on the bottom. They have some eloquent speakers in Rupert, especially on the subject of the natural products of the North Country. Altogether it was a gala occasion, and M. P. McCaffery as president of Prince Rupert Board of Trade, was chairman, and gracefully introduced the visitors, not forgetting to remind them that reports had reached Prince Rupert that Vancouver had done some quiet knocking at her northern neighbor. To this the visiting speakers replied that the "knocking" was unauthorized, irresponsible, and not representative of the good feelings which Vancouver really bore to Prince Rupert. Mayor McClymont put the situation very nicely by replying that Vancouver and Prince Rupert are competitors and pressed the argument that industrial development of the north coast could mean only more trade and greater business for Vancouver merchants and citizens generally."

WHOLE TOWN ON THE WATER

Bathing and Camping Resorts Attract All Who Can Possibly Get Out of City.

Practically the whole town crossed the water yesterday. Every launch and boat on the waterfront was pressed into the service to carry the people to the various resorts, the weather being such that all wanted a chance to bathe or picnic. Most of the people went to the Salt Lakes where bathing was the great attraction. The launches Alice B., Narbethong and Dixie Rupert all carried capacity crowds and boats and canoes and private launches did the rest.

Every bay and beach within many miles had at least one party of picnickers. Some went to Shawatlans, others to Metlakatla and Digby Island was also visited. One of the favorite out of town resorts was Tugwell Island where a number of launches carried large parties and where real sea bathing was enjoyed under ideal conditions. The beach there is large, fairly flat and sandy. It is an ideal spot. If it were not quite so far away Tugwell Island would become the most popular resort for the summer.
