WINNIPEG, Feb. 26 -- "California is growing more and more interested in Canada," declared Robert Creelman, passenger traffic manager of the Canadian National Railways, on his return this morning from a business trip to the Pacific coast. He was accompanied by C. K. Howard, general tourist agent, Montreal. Mr. Creelman went as far as Los Angeles and San Diego. "I was never more impressed," he said, with the prospects for summer tourist traffic from the United States. The Shriners' annual convention will be held at Los Angeles in June and there should be an attendance of at least 75,-000, a great many of the eastern delegates are, bound to come through Canada, and we are already receiving inquiries from Shriners who are anxious to stop over at Jasper on their way to California. Many of them will take the steamship trip from Prince Rupert to Vancouver."


