TWO HUNDRED MILE DOG DERBY RETURNS TO NORTH CO UNTRY



After a lapse of four years, the endurance dog derby which once thrilled the north country and, it might be said, the world, is returning to The Pas, Manitoba. The gruelling non-stop race which brought fame to Northern Manitoba and its hardy mushers will be revived at the frontier town's winter carnival, March 4 to 7. The course will be from The Pas to the famous Flin Flon mine and back, a distance of two hundred miles, and the prizes will consist of the Walter Goyne-Grant Rice memorial cup, which has an intrinsic value of \$1,000, and cash prizes amounting to another \$1,000. The winner will have the dog racing championship of the world. The famous youthful musher, Emil St. Godard, present champion (seen above with his dogs), will be one of the lealing contestants this year, and it is likely that "Shorty" Russick, veteran driver, will also enter. 
