Movement to Secure Western Railway From Peace But Route Left to Experts

The following letters have been received from Vancouver in reply to a letter written them by George Bushby, on behalf of the Peace River outlet committee: Dear Mr. Bushby .- I acknowl-

edged your letter of November 20 re Peace River, and also letter addressed to Mr. Woodward and Mr. R. D. Williams, the vice-president, and wishes to inform you that it will be read to our council at its next meeting which takes place on Thursday, December 5.

In the meantime, permit me to assure you that the attitude of our board and the attitude of the Peace River Association is distinctly and solely an advocacy for an outlet from the Peace to the coast and, so far as I am aware, this will continue to be the policy of those organizations who are interesting hemselves in this movement.

It is our present opinion that in Monday, December 16, 1929 the last analysis the decision in regard to routes must rest in the hands of the engineers of the respective authorities and they, no doubt, will recommend the most economical route to be followed. Just as soon as the council considers your communication I wall advise you.
