OTTAWA, Dec. 21.—Amendments to the Pensions Act with the object of giving more liberal treatment to ex-service men will be introduced at the coming session of Parliament, though just what the nature of the amendments will be. Premier King declined to say.

The Premier said, however, that the government felt that the Board of Pension Commissioners should regard itself rather as the trustee of the rights and benefits which Canada intends for ex-service men and their dependents and not so much as a trustee of public funds.
