Russian Cavalry Made Raid on Manchurian Village but Driven Back by the Chinese Defenders

LONDON, Aug. 20. — Both Chinese and Russian sources today reported warlike activities and preparations along the Manchurian border, with increasing number of border clashes and incursions by opposing armies.

MUKDEN, Aug. 20. — Despatches received here say the Chinese defenders and three thousand Soviet cavalry yesterday engaged in a fierce struggle for the village of Tunginsien, but the invaders were repulsed. Tanks, airplanes and searchlights are reported to be on the way to the front, according to Russian reports.

SOUNDS TOCSIN ECONOMIC WAR

Bennett at Vancouver Calls On Young Conservatives Everywhere to Rally to Cause

VANCOUVER, Aug. 20. — Calling on young Conservatives, men and women throughout the Dominion, Hon. R. B. Bennett yesterday stressed the necessity of rallying to the defense of Canada in the "great economic war" being waged. He was addressing the Conservative Association at a luncheon here.

"Without being conscious of it, there is going on in this country, as in other countries, a great economic war," said Mr. Bennett. "It is a war of commerce. Other countries are making efforts to sell their goods in Canada. In every country people are endeavoring to sell goods and economic penetration is going on every day. It is necessary for Canada to meet the situation and if the nation is to survive and grow to greatness the issue must be faced courageously. Canada has weapons to use in economic defense. Are we going to use them or are we not?" he asked.

TWO PERISHED IN A BLIZZARD

SEATTLE, Aug. 20. — Miss Thelma Martin, librarian of Seattle, and K. Furuya, a Japanese artist of Portland, were victims of a blizzard on Mount Shuksan, Washington, near Mount Baker. The two were frozen to death late Sunday when a storm surprised them as they with another couple were scaling Chimney Peak. Furuya was the first to succumb. A party left early this morning to bring the bodies out.

THORNTON IS IN VANCOUVER

Says Crop Failure Does Not Approach Disaster; Tells of New Boats

VANCOUVER, Aug. 20. — En route to Prince Rupert, Sir Henry Thornton arrived here last night on his annual tour of inspection. "This year's crop does not approach disaster and it takes more than one indifferent yield to affect Canada's prosperity," Sir Henry declared.

Sir Henry announced that the three new vessels for the coast service which were being built in England would be ready for service next summer and that with their advent there would be a service out of Vancouver to Victoria and Seattle, linking up with Prince Rupert, Alaska and other northern points. He said the new hotel here would be known as "The Canadian National."

EVERYBODY SAFE FROM FIRE NEAR BOUNDARY

NELSON, Aug. 20. — Vic Johnson, Slocan Lake lumberman, his wife and two daughters and 20 loggers believed to have been trapped by the monster forest fire raging at Evans Creek, are reported safe. A special rescue crew reached them and found them unharmed by the flames. The party would not leave the locality.

EXPLOSION IN RUMANIAN FORT

BUCHAREST, Aug. 20. — At least 18 soldiers were killed and 10 wounded when an immense quantity of ammunition in Fort Momesti near here blew up last night. It is feared that a number of workmen in the buildings were also killed. Owing to continued explosions the rescuers were unable to approach within two miles of the buildings.

CHECK ARTIST DRAWS THREE MONTHS JAIL

Clarence J. Scott Hall Sent Down For Fraud—Suspended Sentence in Breaking Case

Clarence J. Scott Hall, who was committed for trial recently on a charge of obtaining money fraudulently by passing false checks, came up before Judge H. A. Robertson of Prince George in County Court here yesterday afternoon and, electing for speedy trial, was sentenced to three months' imprisonment. Charles Dobbie, who elected speedy trial and pleaded guilty on a charge of breaking and entering, was given one year's suspended sentence.

LIQUOR PROFIT IS DISTRIBUTED

VICTORIA, Aug. 20. — The government announced distribution of liquor profits amounting to \$682,919 covering the six months period ending March 31, 1929 among 73 municipalities. Vancouver receives the largest amount, \$280,525. The distribution is based on the largest returns from liquor profits yet obtained.

Other amounts are: Prince Rupert, \$8,431. Prince George, \$2,991. Smithers, \$1,865. Terrace, \$1,386. Vanderhoof, \$828.

Disarmament Negotiations are Advanced a Step With Message Received from United States

LOSSIEMOUTH, Scotland, Aug. 20. — Premier Ramsay MacDonald stated today that he was studying a message from Washington which he discussed with Ambassador Dawes yesterday regarding disarmament negotiations which marks a distinct advance in negotiations between the two countries.

This message is the outcome of negotiations commenced almost directly the Labor Government assumed office and gives promise of a successful culmination which may eventually be extended to other countries.

HOME OIL HAS SPLENDID WELL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20. — The United States army has taken away the soldiers' rattles. It has been found that these accessories of the soldiers' life, used in war time for the unplayful purpose of warning against gas attacks, sounded too much like the "rat-a-tat" of machine gun fire. So today the war department, on the recommendation of the chiefs of the infantry and chemical warfare service, eliminated them from the field equipment.

A claxon type horn will be employed hereafter for spreading alarms, notifying the soldiers to don their gas masks.

HOME OIL HAS SPLENDID WELL

Production Now Set at Thousand Barrels Daily—Best in Turner Valley

CALGARY, June 20. — Home No. 3 well has increased its flow to thirty million cubic feet of gas this morning with an estimated yield of a thousand barrels of naphtha daily. The gas was extremely wet.

This makes this the biggest producer in the Turner Valley and gives Home Oil a production of 2500 barrels daily from the three wells.

New Cold Storage Plant Planned for Cow Bay City Council Agrees

First announcement of another new industrial enterprise for Prince Rupert came at last night's meeting of the city council when a letter was read from M. Y. Aivazoff of Vancouver asking the council to recommend to the provincial government the leasing to him of 275 feet of waterfront in Cow Bay, upon which the erection of an ice and cold storage plant and wharf and floats for fish dealers and fishermen was contemplated. Mr. Aivazoff stated that he had been working on the project for some time and was now ready to go ahead with the construction.

Mayor McMordie was in favor of meeting the request to recommend the site lease to the government. He felt that the council should do all in its power to assist any new industries in coming here. He felt the lease should be granted on the definite undertaking by Mr. Aivazoff that he would go ahead.

The requested approval was granted on motion of Ald. Brown, seconded by Ald. Macdonald.

PRIVY COUNCIL APPEAL WILL NOT BE ABOLISHED BY AUSTRALIA JUST NOW

CANBERRA, Australia, Aug. 20. — Australia does not intend to take any action to abolish its right of appeal to the judicial committee of the privy council, Premier Bruce declared, when discussing reports from London that the British government is willing to permit any dominion to abolish the right of appeal if desired, as exemplified by a recent request of the Irish Free State.

REPARATIONS ARE WORRYING

Recent Proposal Being Investigated Further to Find Out How Countries Affected

THE HAGUE, Aug. 20. — German Foreign Minister Stresemann has written Premier Jaspard of Belgium asking him to call the six powers together to consider what action will be taken on reparations payments if the Young plan is not adopted before September 1.

The reparations experts, who worked until midnight in an effort to reconcile conflicting estimates of the yield in money of the four-power offer to Great Britain, were hard at work again today.
