NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its present session by the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert (hereinafter called "the City") after called "the Corporation" under an Act empowering the City to sell, free from all encumbrances upon such terms as it may deem fit, to the Power Corporation of Canada, Limited, (hereinafter called "the Company"), the entire assets of its electric light and power department as a going concern, and to grant to the Company the sole and exclusive right, licence and privilege to carry on in the City of Prince Rupert the business of a light, heat and power company, and for such purposes to install, extend, operate, repair and maintain in the said City's streets, lanes and other public places poles, conduits, surface and underground wires, cables and all other equipment and appliances for the transmission, distribution and sale of electric power for light, heat and power purposes, and empowering the City to enter into an agreement with the Company for supplying to the City and its citizens electric light, heat and power upon such terms and conditions as the City may deem fit, and further empowering the City to hereafter purchase or take over the whole or any part of the Company's electric light and power system upon such terms as may be agreed upon, and to validate a bylaw (if assented to by the electors, to whom it is to be submitted) empowering the City to enter into an agreement with the Company authorizing the City to enter into the same and to validate the said agreement and to grant and confirm to the Company all the powers, privileges, and rights thereby conferred.
