Sport

Baseball seems to be at a standstill for the past few days. There have been no games since the Vancouver team came up and gave an exhibition on the Aeropolis grounds. There are surely enough young men interested in the city to form a couple of teams and matches could be played throughout the week. It would always be practise for the senior nine as well as exercise for the other players of the team.

An impetus has been given to boating in the last few evenings on account of the long light and warm breezes on the harbor. Water sports ought to be very popular in Prince Rupert and with the appearance of the Rowing Club shell on Monday evening there ought to be others taking to the water for practise. A very feasible plan would be the placing of boats on the Salt Lake which is large enough to hold a large number. There should be at least one boat tied up at the float now in case of emergency. Two recent accidents indicate the necessity.

Should there be fine weather it is very likely that a few mountain hikes will be arranged. It is not very difficult to climb Mt. Morse. However, it is not entirely obligatory to leave this side, for to ascend Mt. Kaien at the back of the townsite gives as promising a view of the country around as anyone would ever wish to see. All the little islands lie very picturesquely studded in the blue waters beyond Digby Island.

Old Country papers to hand tell of an exceptionally interesting boxing match arranged as the chief item on the program at the National Sporting Club, London, between Johnny Basham, welter-weight champion, and Augie Ratner of America, for a purse and stakes amounting to \$6,000. Ratner, it may be recalled, won the middleweight competition for the American army at the Albert Hall tournament and is a boxer of considerable skill. The match was one of 20 rounds at 154 pounds. When the fight began at 10:25 it was possible to get 6 to 4 on Basham. As the men stood up Ratner looked far too big for his opponent. Good as Ratner was known to be, he exercised cleverness against a very fine boxer that was rather unexpected, added to which a little extra weight told in his favor. In the tenth Ratner got home a very fine left hook and sent Basham to the ropes and it was fairly obvious by this time that the Welshman was up against one of the stiffest problems of his career. Splendid defence by both men marked the closing rounds. Basham began to get a little better towards the end and was making the pace hot and taking the lead, but the American's defence was good and he was hard to land on. The further the fight went the better both boxed and the bout ended with even honors and the result was declared a draw.

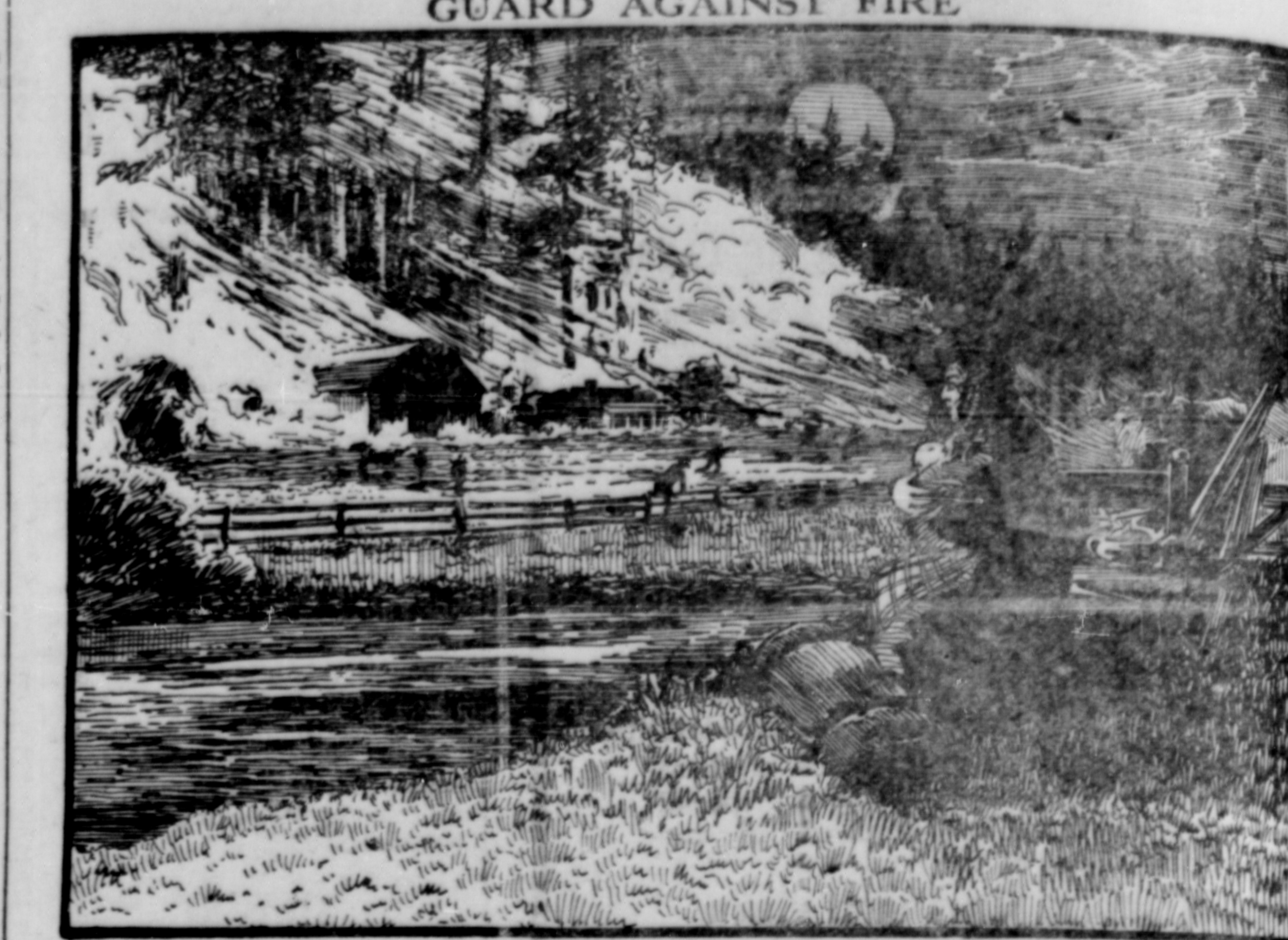
