Trial of Seized U. S. Trollers Commences at Victoria Before Justice Martin in Admiralty

Owner of Tacora Declares He Was Ill and Vessel Was in Need of Repair, So He Quit Fishing and Went to Goose Island Harbor

VICTORIA, July 10.—Personal illness caused by gas fumes escaping from the engine of the vessel and the need for repairs to the engine were cited by Captain John A. Eastman, master and owner of the United States fishing troller Tacora, in the admiralty division of the exchequer court of Canada here yesterday as the reason why the Tacora was driven to harbor at Goose Bay anchorage May 5 last.

The defence of the United States craft was entered after Captain Fred Laird and other officers of the Canadian Government fisheries protective cruiser Malaspina had told Mr. Justice Martin of the seizure of the launch on May 6.

Hearing of the defence witnesses was completed yesterday and argument by counsel was commenced this morning.

In his evidence yesterday Eastman said he had been unwell on May 3 and 4 and on the following day a suspicious illness caused by gas from the exhaust of the Tacora's engine bothered him. It was then decided not to continue fishing operations any longer. He said he took the boat into Goose Harbor to see if he could locate the part of the vessel's engine which was leaking and to get some exercise himself in the hope of working off the effects of the fumes.

The second defence witness, Ernest Tourila of Seattle, corroborated Eastman's testimony concerning the latter's illness. He said he never smelt any gas, nor did it bother him, but he stated he saw some light smoke in the engine room. He considered it would have been dangerous to have taken the engine apart at sea and unsafe to attempt repairs unless the vessel was taken into harbor.

PLACE FIFTY BOYS ON FARMS

B. C. Government Undertakes Settlement Scheme for Old Country Lads

VICTORIA, July 10.—The placing of 50 British boys on farms in the province through the Empire settlement scheme has been undertaken by the B. C. Government, following a conference between Provincial Government officials and W. B. Little, federal commissioner of colonization at Ottawa, it was announced by Hon. W. Atkinson, minister of agriculture.

CONDUCTOR WAS KILLED BY AUTO

VANCOUVER, July 10.—John Cardwell, 50 years of age, and for 18 years a conductor on the street railway, was instantly killed at the intersection of Cambie Street and 25th Avenue last night when he was struck by an auto. He was found in a dying condition on the street and is believed to have been the victim of a hit and run driver.

SALVAGE EFFORTS STEAMER ISLANDER FAILED, SAYS DIVER

JUNEAU, July 10.—Efforts to salvage the reputed treasure from the steamer Islander, which sank August 15, 1901, were discontinued yesterday when Captain S. H. Finch, who directed the diving for the purser's safe, sailed for Seattle. The search was in progress for 60 days when Finch's contract expired. He declared that he had failed to find anything.

INQUIRY INTO DEATH OF BOY AT ARRANDALE

Native Lad Must Have Fallen Into River When Boarding Boat

INQUEST WAS HELD
 Funeral Arrangements Stopped in Order That Full Inquiry Might Be Made

ARRANDALE, Naas River, B.C., July 10.—In connection with the drowning fatality which occurred at Arrandale cannery last Thursday afternoon, July 4, the body of Frederick Doolan, an Indian lad, aged 11 years, was recovered from the water below the cannery wharf by William Lawson and James Stewart about 6 p.m., after dragging operations had been in progress for upward of two hours. Artificial respiration, without success, was resorted to by C. J. Griffen, bookkeeper, and Mrs. Griffen, a trained nurse. Deceased was missed about 4 p.m., when about to go to a gasoline fishing boat, on which he had been hired to act as engineer by an independent fisherman. In order to do so he had to descend a ladder to a scow about 20 feet below the wharf, then jump to another scow before reaching his boat. While no one saw him fall into the water, it is surmised that he slipped when jumping from one scow to another and struck his head when rising to the surface, as no outcry was raised.

On hearing of the accident, Dominion Constable E. G. Newham, who was away up-river, hurried to Arrandale, picking up Dr. Macdonald off Kincolith on the way, and arrived about noon on Friday, July 5.

Constable Newham immediately stopped the funeral arrangements, ordered the body to be held

BAIT SHORTAGE AT KETCHIKAN

An acute shortage of halibut bait has arisen at Ketchikan and it was reported today that there was not a pound of frozen herring available there to supply the fishing fleet. The motorship Bellingham, Capt. J. E. Anderson, paying her first here in four months, arrived in port from the north at midnight last night and today loaded 100 tons of frozen herring at the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. for Ketchikan.

It is expected that the Bellingham will start about the middle of this month to bring regular shipments of fresh and frozen salmon and halibut here from Ketchikan for transshipment east over the Canadian National Railways.

MAKING PROGRESS IN CANOE ON WAY DOWN COAST TO NEW YORK

WORK OF NURSE AS A CITIZEN DISCUSSED

Nurse Who is Member of Swedish Parliament Addresses Montreal Congress

MONTREAL, July 10.—The nurse with the feeling of responsibility can understand easily the duties of a citizen because in her private actions she already is a contributing member of the community, Sister Bertha Wellin, member of the Swedish Parliament and president of the Swedish Nurses' Association told the nurses of more than 40 countries at a meeting of the Congress of the International Council of Nurses.

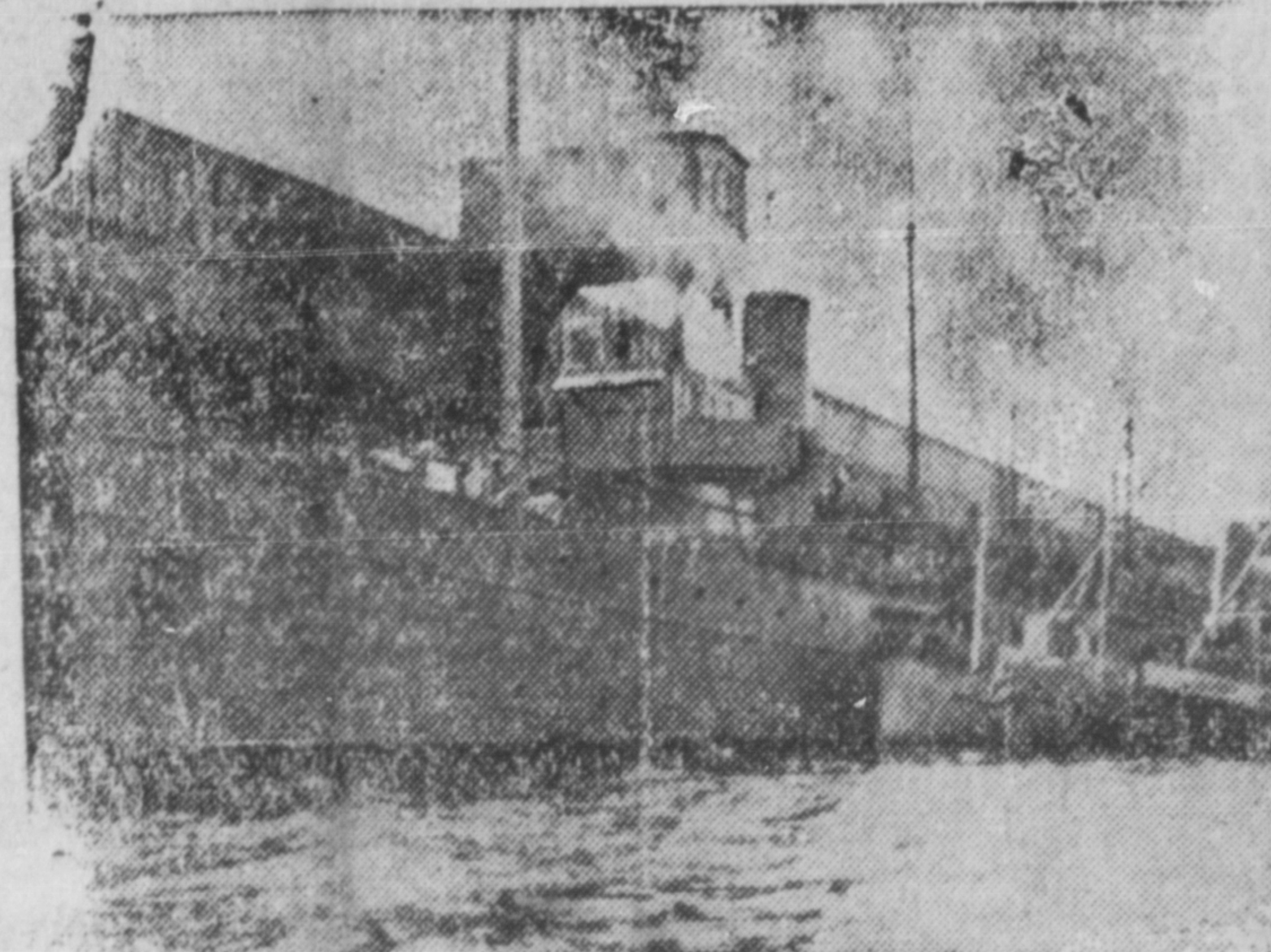
"We are not like other professions. We cannot isolate ourselves and our work," the speaker said. "When a young woman is accepted as a student nurse the responsibility for her actions becomes widened. During the whole of our activity as nurses, we exercise an influence upon the opinion which people hold of the school of nursing which has trained us and upon the organization to which we belong."

Warning her hearers against the entrance of nurses' associations into political work, Sister Wellin pointed out that as individual citizens, nurses could contribute much in educating others in good citizenship.

VISITS SCENE NIKKO WRECK

Housing of Vessel Smashed and Boat Washed Ashore and Clothing But No Bodies

SKIDEGATE, July 10.—Provincial Constable Martin of Queen Charlotte Islands returned from the scene of the wrecked boat Nikko and reports finding two caps, one coat, and all the deck housing of the Nikko smashed off and the hatches gone and one small boat nearby turned upside down. No bodies have yet been found.

H. Fujiwara, owner of the saltery at Queen Charlotte City, who is supposed to have been lost on the vessel along with the members of the crew, is spoken of here as a very estimable man, a gentleman in every sense of the word. He leaves a widow at Queen Charlotte City.

People of the Islands are again asking for a lighthouse at Lawn Hill as it is claimed the floating buoy there now cannot be seen until too late to keep clear of the rocks.

NATIVES LEAVE FOR CANNERIES

Failure of West Coast Trolling Drives Hydahs to Mainland This Year

SKIDEGATE, July 10.—Nearly all the natives of the Skidegate Mission have left for the Skeena River fishing grounds, some to Claxton and some under care of Chief Russ and Chief Sugai for the new cannery at Humpback Bay, Porcher Island. This is the first time for many years that the Hydahs have left their island home for the mainland and the move became necessary because of the failure of the west coast trolling.

BOWSER SLATED FOR CABINET

Vancouver Paper Declared Pooly Will Go to London and Former Leader Return

The Vancouver Sun declares that there is to be a reorganization of the Tolmie cabinet in which Attorney General Pooly is slated for the Agent Generalship in London and W. J. Bowser is to take his place in the cabinet as attorney general and first lieutenant of Dr. Tolmie. The story says that W. K. Esling, George Black, J. C. Brady and J. A. Fraser are all dyed-in-the-wool Bowser men and they prevailed upon the leaders to bring about the suggested change in face of the opposition of such men as General McRae, Leon Ladner, and H. H. Stevens.

Should Tolmie resign Mr. Bowser would then be the natural choice for premier. It is suggested that the change will not be brought about until after the visit of Hon. R. B. Bennett who is to spend a month in the province.

COMMUNICATION WITH SUBMARINE FAILED

PEMBROKE, Wales, July 10.—The British submarine L-69 today dived in the vicinity of the stricken H-47 and tried to communicate with the 21 men trapped within her but without avail. The sunken craft lies in 330 feet of water.

T. L. CHURCH, M.P., IS SERIOUSLY ILL

TORONTO, July 10.—T. L. Church, K.C., Conservative member of the federal parliament and former mayor of this city, who has been ill for some time, has suffered a relapse and is now seriously ill.

KINGSFORD SMITH HAS ARRIVED IN ENGLAND

CROYDON, England, July 10.—Captain Charles Kingsford Smith and three companions in the Southern Cross arrived here today from Rome, completing their flight from Sydney, New South Wales.

PRINCE ACTS FOR THE KING

LONDON, July 10.—The Prince of Wales held a private investiture today on behalf of the King at St. James Palace. The prince presented insignias to 860 persons in the birthday honors list.

Exiled Prince Carol Said to be Implicated in Rumanian Coup

BUCHAREST, July 10.—Documents allegedly confiscated by the Government in its roundup of military conspirators against the present regime have definitely implicated the exiled Prince Carol in the projected coup d'etat. The documents comprised proclamations to the people and to the army, all bearing the signature in the name of His Majesty King Carol II.

It was said it appeared that the exiled prince was fully aware of the preparations for the plot and gave his consent to it.

OIL EXPERTS ON VISIT TO GRAHAM ISLAND JUST NOW

SKIDEGATE, July 10.—American oil experts are looking over the property of C. D. Emmens, which lies between the Yakoun Lake and Rennel Sound. The engineers are John Campbell of Laredo, Texas, W. Gallier of Palo Alto, California, and Robert M. Klimpel of Los Angeles.

WILL AGAIN SEEK IMPROVEMENT FOR VIOLET PARK GROUND

Prince Rupert East Ratepayers' Association, at a meeting last night, decided to send a delegation to the city council with the request that the decision not to undertake improvements of Violet Park as a children's playground this year be reconsidered. The people of the east end of the city feel that they are entitled to have the work carried out.

Miss M. B. Durran of the executive presided at the meeting in the absence of the president, Ex-Alderman G. B. Casey.

SWEDISH FLIGHT ACROSS OCEAN

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, July 10.—Captain Aldin Ahrenberg, the Swedish flyer, hopped off from Reykjavik for Greenland this afternoon in continuation of his flight from Sweden to the United States.

KILLED IN WALES

BLAENAVON, Wales, July 10.—Four men were killed and several seriously injured today in an explosion at Milfraen mining pit.

GILDA SCUTARI PROBABLY LOST

SEATTLE, July 10.—The family of Captain William Dooley of the S. S. Gilda Scutari, missing since the vessel sailed for Japan from here November 5, said yesterday that Captain Cochrane of the coastguard cutter Chelan unofficially reported to them that final search of the Aleutian Islands failed to reveal any trace of the vessel.

The ship carried a crew of 26 and there is a remote possibility, shipping men say, that she might have reached the Siberian coast. The Gilda Scutari was formerly the Empress of Montreal and prior to that the Canadian Trader.

BABE RUTH HIT HIS EIGHTEENTH

NEW YORK, July 10.—Babe Ruth yesterday hit his eighteenth homer of the season in the fourth inning for the Yankees against St. Louis and also registered a triple. The Yankees are now seven and a half games behind Philadelphia.

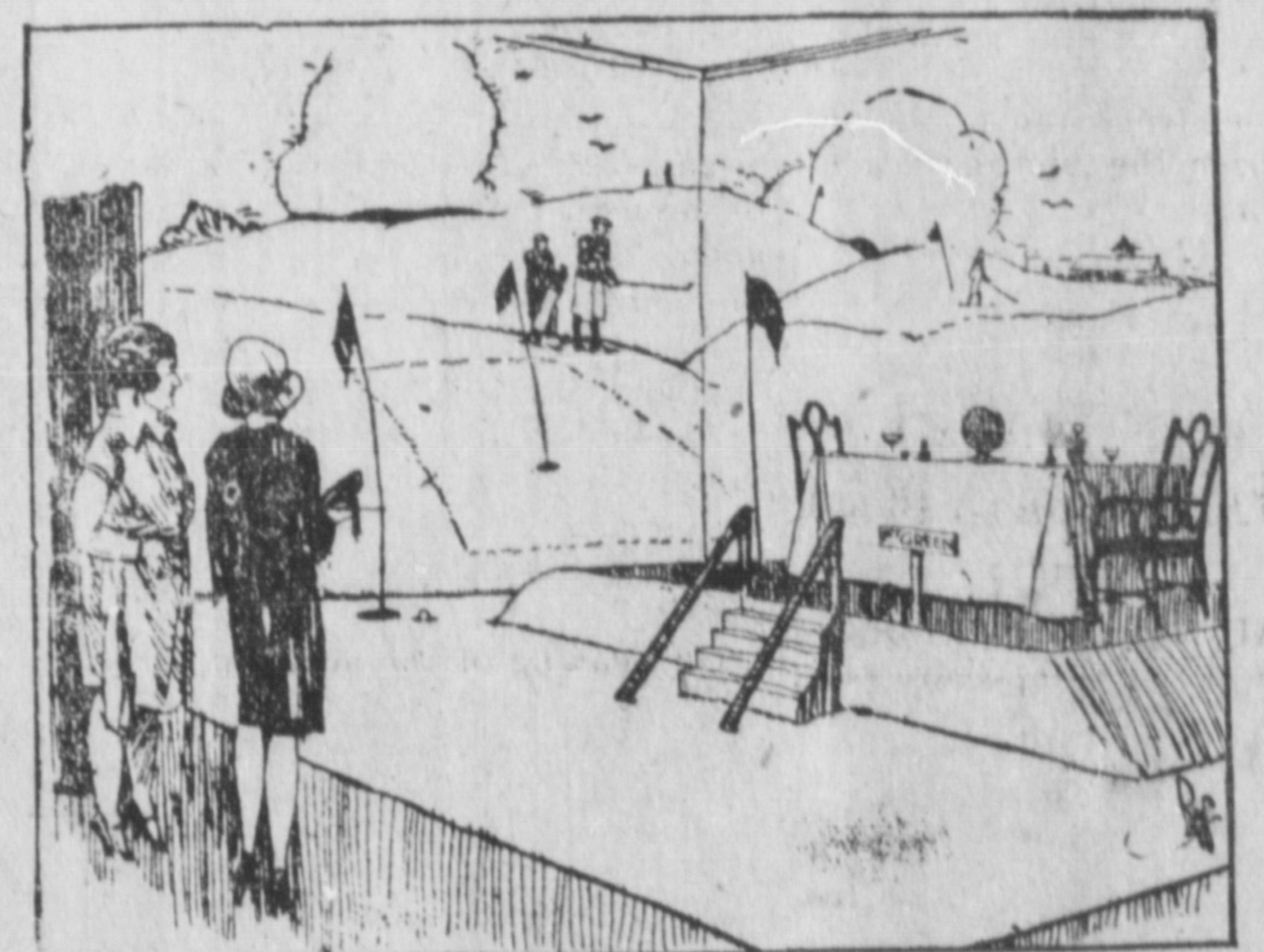
