He said he never smelt any gas, nor did it bother him, but he stated he saw some light smoke in the engine room. He considered it would have been dangerous to have taken the engine apart at sea and unsafe to attempt repairs un'ess the vessel was taken into harbor.



No bodies have yet been found.

The documents comprised proclamations to the people and to the army, all bearing the signature in the name of His Majesty King Carol II.

It was said it appeared that the exiled prince was fully aware of the preparations for the plot and gave his consent to it.


