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Not Jealous of Prince Rupert

John Stewart Just Down From the Mining Camp Says They Will Co-operate SEES BRIGHT FUTURE

Thinks Peace River Will Be Linked Up With Prince Rupert and Portland Canal Later

"There is no jealousy between Stewart and Prince Rupert," declared John Stewart, a Stewart mining man and one of the founders of the town on Portland Canal who was in the city south-bound last evening. "If Prince Rupert gets the railway first, as we expect she will, we shall all benefit, for what benefits one place benefits the other."

"My information is," said Mr. Stewart, "that there will be something doing before very long in railway circles, and I think it will benefit Prince Rupert. Our turn will come later when the wonderful Hay River country and the mines of the interior are tapped by the Stewart Railway."

Mr. Stewart said while business had been quiet in Stewart this year and development seemingly slow, he was satisfied that the big mining companies were not there for nothing and that very soon there would be great activity in the Portland Canal section. "Those people are not spending their money there unless they expect to get something out," he declared.

Mr. Stewart told of the wonderful activity of the Consolidated in the Bowser Lake country where they had over one hundred claims and where there was every indication of a great mass of ore. He also said the syndicate, which was recently formed to prospect by airplane, had been successful in staking a dozen good claims of which they were very hopeful. These were only 25 miles from Stewart and if they proved to be good the Anaconda people would take them and develop them. It used to be that the poor prospector went around begging the mining companies to take their properties but that was all changed now. Today the big companies were eager to get good properties and if they saw anything that looked worth while they took it at once. The whole situation was reversed. There was a time when the prospector had as good a chance as he had today.
