Local improvement taxes are now due and payable at the Collector's Office, City Hall. Ten per cent penalty added after October 1. (228)

The formal opening of the Catholic Bazaar will take place at 8 o'clock, Wednesday night in the Moose Hall. Speakers, Bishop Buzoz, Mayor McMordie and J. C. Brady, M.P.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Welford, formerly of this city, are now residing in Calgary where Mr. Welford is in charge of one of the departments of a new store which was opened in that city this year by the T. Eaton Co.

A report from the city solicitor that the city was not liable in connection with the sinking of E. A. Group's house in Section Five was read at last night's council meeting and filed.

On recommendation of the finance committee, the city council last night put through its first readings a bylaw providing for the temporary borrowing of \$50,000 from the Royal Bank of Canada pending the collection of this year's taxes.

Bert Boyd, recently chief of the Prince Charles, has now taken over the duties of chief engineer aboard the steamer Prince Rupert following the departure of Chief Engineer Alex Monroe for the Old Country to supervise engine installation in one of the company's new ships William Ballantyne, formerly second engineer of the steamer Prince Rupert, is now chief of the Prince Charles.

A recommendation from the finance committee that a bond offered by the Power Corporation of Canada in connection with the taking over of light deposits be accepted and that all active deposits be placed in the hands of the corporation was adopted by the city council last night. The transfer was provided for in the contract whereby the Power Corporation took over the local electric light franchise.

Reports from Fire Chief D. H. McDonald covering the months of July and August were presented at last night's meeting of the city council. In July fire loss in the city amounted to \$71, expenses of the department for the month being \$1,585.65 and in August the damage was \$133 with departmental expense \$1,219.50, equipment of the department, including fire alarm boxes, was reported to be in good order.

Mayor S. P. McMordie will represent Prince Rupert at the convention of the Good Road's League at Harrison Hot Springs on October 14 and the convention of the Union of B.C. Municipalities on October 15 and 16 at the same place. It was decided by the city council last night on recommendation of the finance committee. On motion of Ald. Brown seconded by Ald. Dibb, Ald. Collart was designated to be acting mayor during Col. McMordie's absence.

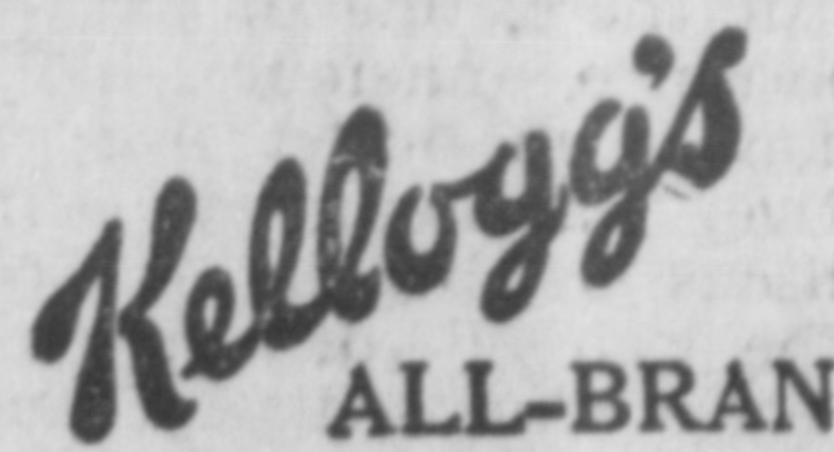

The matter was referred to the board of works for report.

A letter from W. P. Armour, pointing out the dangerous condition owing to thick growth of brush there and stating that children were menaced by vehicular traffic there and that there was no room for cars to pass at the upper end, was read at last night's meeting of the city council, the matter being referred to the board of works with power to act.

Certiorari applications of Milton Gonzales, on behalf of Alfred Benson Robert Thompson and James Davidson, in which convictions and fines of \$300 each by Magistrate McClymont for having liquor in the abode of an Indian and a conviction and fine of \$10 by Superintendent Magistrate E. T. Kenney against Peter Morgan for illegal possession of fur, were appealed, were adjourned to Vancouver for hearing a week from tomorrow by Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald in Supreme Court yesterday afternoon. Neither E. F. Jones, crown counsel in the Indian Act cases, nor W. E. Fisher, acting as crown counsel in the Game Act case, were prepared to proceed.

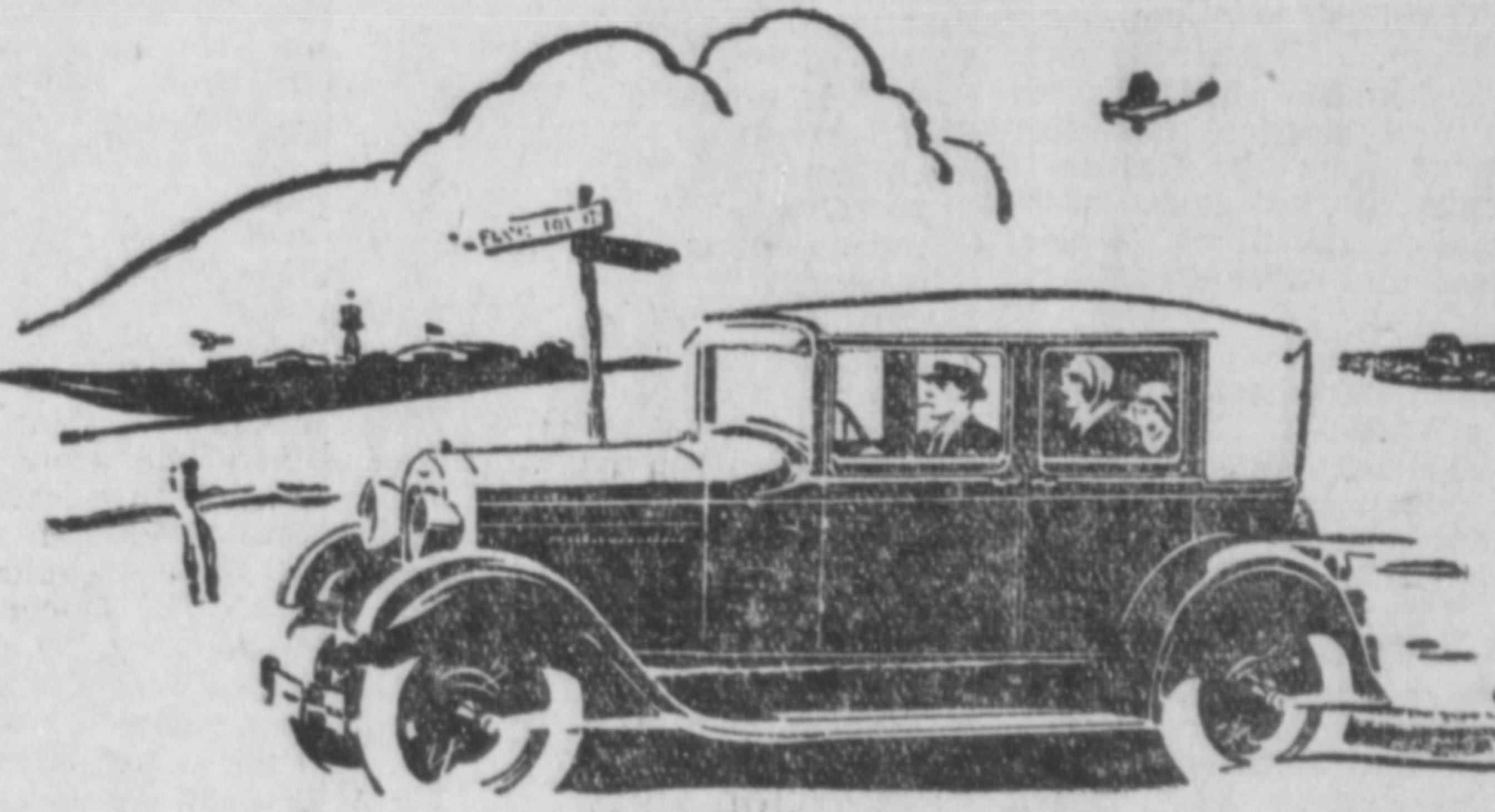
