Labor Troubles at Liverpool Continue; Bayonets are Used

Compensation Board Has Right to Pay Dependents of Sophia Sailors.

A week before the treaty was Lot 18, block 26, M. M. Stephens signed several chaplains through a misunderstanding informed the soldiers that marriages were permissible as soon as the Germans accepted the peace terms. Officers say marriages took place before this belief was corrected by a special order calling the attention of officers and men to the fact that until the United States ratified the treaty Germany and America technically were at war.
