## WATER NOTICE DIVERSION AND USE.

TAKE NOTICE that W. R. Tonkin, whose address is 558 Empire Building, Seattle, Wash., will apply for a licence to take and use fifty (50) feet per second (25,000 acre feet) of water out of Clear Lake, also known as Clearwater Lake, which flows westerly and drains into Kitauit River, about twenty-four miles from its mouth. The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about 300 feet from the mouth of Clearwater Lake and will be used for mining purposes upon the "Last Chance" mine described as the "Last Chance" group of mineral claims.

This notice was posted on the ground on the 27th day of June, 1919. A copy of this notice and an application pursuant thereto to the "Water Act, 1914," will be filed in the office of the Water Recorder at Prince Rupert, B.C. ## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to one acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before recording Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence, for lease, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or records same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation with his farm, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessibility by existing roads may be purchased to them. Release of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

## PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of pre-emptions or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

## SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

## GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for establishment of stock-owners may be given. Free, or partially free, permission for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
