SUN LIFE HELD ANNUAL MEETING

Striking Statement of President at Gathering in Montreal Yesterday

MONTREAL, Feb. 13.—At the annual meeting of the Sun Life Assurance Company yesterday, President T. B. Macaulay in reviewing the policy of the company pointed out that the Sun Life maintained its position as the largest company in the British Empire. Possibly the most striking statement made by the president was that if the market value of the securities held by the company were reduced by \$100,000,000 the surplus of the company would not be reduced one dollar. This indicates that the securities are not valued at the present market price much under that amount.

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SPRING SALMON BEING CAUGHT AT SIMPSON

Native Fishermen Have Been Trolling With Success For Past Month

Native fishermen have been successfully trolling for spring salmon off the reefs outside of Rose Island at Port Simpson for the past month, according to Dr. R. G. Large, medical superintendent of the Port Simpson Hospital, who was an overnight visitor in town. Most of the fish so far caught has been consumed locally at Port Simpson but, with high prices offering in Prince Rupert, it is expected that the good catches from now on will be brought here.

Seining for herring is also in full swing around Port Simpson, states Dr. Large.
