Newfoundland Schooner, Victim of Hurricane, Was Laboring in Heavy Sea

NEW YORK, Dec. 6:- The rescue of five seamen from the disabled schooner Northern Light in a heavy sea is reported in a message today to the office of the White Star line from the liner Baltic, due in New York Monday from Liverpool.

The Northern Light was one of ten Newfoundland schooners missing when caught in a hurricane while en route from St. John's for Bonavista ports.

Only two boats are now missing though four were lost and their crews rescued while others were badly battered. No loss life is yet reported.
