Assistance Proffered by Interior Board of Trade Acknowledged

The following letter has been sent by Ald. Theo Collart, chairman of the Prince Rupert-Peace River Out-let Committee, to H. M. Mathews, secretary, Smithers District Board of Trade: I was pleased to receive your letter of December 12 and was surprised, at the same time, to learn that you had written me as soon as you got the circular letter concerning the Peace River outlet. I must say that your letter never reached me and cannot understand how it could have gone astray, so have enquired at the post office here, but they tell me it must be at Smithers post office that probably a mistake pletely gone." was made.

I want to thank you, on behalf of the association, for the interest you are taking in this movement to secure for the Peace River farmers the right to get their products to the market by the most economical and shortest route to the coast, and, since such a route must come to Prince Rupert to reach a port already provided with shipping facilities, it will have the effect of giving an impetus to the development of the country through which it will pass, and that, naturally, will be the First Half of Schedule Completed northern and central part of British Columbia. It will not matter which way the route goes if it comes straight west, because the development of this port depends on the development of the country along the C.N.R., and vice versa. Our only aim is to show the powers that be that the Peace River people. as well as the people along the C.N.R., have a right to have a place in the sun as well as the other parts of the province and the only way to do that is to keep up the agitation until a decision is made.

The maritime provinces have succeeded in their fight for their right to share in the prosperity of the rest of Canada, although it took time and money to succeed. The provinces of Manitoba and Saskatchewan have also, through their constant agitation and representation to the government, been successful in getting the Hudson Bay Railway built, and there is no reason on earth why the Pace River country part of British Columbia should not

secure what is their right as well. To carry on that fight we need noney, and the idea of this association is to secure funds to provide mainly for advertising in the pasider that the east is the main factor in the matter. It is all very well to say that the engineers will have the last say in the matter, but from past experience we all know that such is not often the case and that 'pull and politics' have a lot to do with it. Such articles as the one in the Interior News the other day, putting the question in the most vivid and impressive manner in regard to the P.G.E., if sent to some pers would go a long way to open the eyes of those who will have the weight in the balance when it comes to a decision as to the proper out-

How Can Help

The best way, then, I imagine, that you could be of real help and assistance for the carrying on of this fight would be to interest the people in your district in buying 'booster buttons" which we are issuing as a membership fee in the association at \$1 each, in order to help the financial part of it. At our MIXED NUTSend here we have already sold number of them and secured also from the present city counneil an appropriation of \$300 to help along. We hope to do much better, of course, with the incoming council and get them to provide a larger sum in the estimates. As you must have seen in the papers in the south each municipality is asked to provide some funds for the campaign, and the committee has been provided, free of charge, with furnished offices for all time necessary as decided by the committee.

The next thing would be, as you have already done, to get from time to time articles in your daily paper, or write articles for eastern papers dealing with the subject. You will see on the envelope enclosed that we have a slogan printed that will go all over the country through private correspondence and suggest that your business men might do the same. We are also taking a full page in the Evening Empire special Christmas edition giving all particulars about the question of the CRANBERRIES-Peace River outlet. Any other means of putting the matter forward in the most illuminating manner that you might suggest would be welcomed, because we cannot ne-

glect the least thing that we believe RED might be a factor in our favor. If you wish me to mail you some buttons I shall be only too glad to do so, and would like to hear from you again at your earliest convenience. I must say in passing that the Fairview Board of Trade, in the Peace River, have pledged themselves to sell a hundred buttons, and that enquiries are coming from all over the country as far as the Queen Charlotte Islands, and that even from friends in California and Seattle in particular we have been HOLLYasked for buttons. It is a gratifying proof that not only the whole of the northern part of British Columbia is deeply interested, but that even old residents of this part of the province are in with us, and I feel it is a very good omen. for the ulti-mate result of this fight which can but only end in a great victory.
