VICTORIA CUBS CHECK VICTORIOUS CAREER OF VANCOUVER LIONS, DEFEATING THEM IN CLOSELY CONTESTED HOCKEY LAST NIGHT

VANCOUVER, Jan. 22.—Vancouver's string of victories in a row on the home ice in the Pacific coast hockey games came to an end last night, when the Victoria Cubs, serving up a sparkling brand of play, defeated the leaders 3 to 2 in an overtime struggle.

The Lions took the lead in the first period when they scored a counter. The Cubs equalized in the second period and each scored again in the third. Victoria won after seven minutes overtime when Kelly scored.

CANADIANS ON HOCKEY TEAM AT CAMBRIDGE

CAMBRIDGE, England, Jan. 21.—Two Canadians and three graduates of United States colleges have been chosen for the Cambridge University ice hockey team.

The Canadians are G. Graham (Trinity), who played at Queen's College, Kingston, and W. G. Speechley (St. John's), former Alberta University goal-guard, whose work in the cage saved the Oxford game last year.

The Cambridge captain is Cecil Wynde (Caius College), who won his letter at Harvard two years ago and was a member of the British Olympic six. Another veteran of last year's campaign is D. Graham (Jesus College) of Philadelphia, former Yale freshman player and captain of a championship Eli water-polo team.

Much is expected of John Watts (Trinity) of Morristown, N. J. Watts is a former captain of hockey at St. Paul's School, Concord, N.H., an institution famous for its puck artists, although he is more well known as a Harvard oarsman.

Most prominent among the three Swiss and two Englishmen who complete the list is the young Earl of Lincoln. The young lord is not only one of the few good true English hockey players, but is a well-known cricketer as well.

MILLIONAIRE IS INSULTED

TORONTO, Jan. 21.—Contending that he and Harry Holmes, his manager, had both been insulted by the sporting public of Toronto, "Teddy" Oke, millionaire sportsman and owner of the Toronto Millionaires of the Canadian Professional Hockey league, Monday announced that he was through with all sport in Toronto except the Parkdale Ladies' Athletic Club."

"Harry Holmes and myself have both been insulted by the Toronto sporting public—and we do not intend to be insulted any longer than we can help," he said. "In my opinion, Toronto is the 'smallest' big town on the American continent."

The insult, according to Oke, came when the public refused to attend Canadian professional hockey games in this city. "I spent money freely for the good of sport in Toronto and yet I was deserted by the fans when I put my pre-hockey team in here and tried to give them good hockey," he said "and if I can get permission I am going to withdraw my team from Toronto and play the rest of the schedule out on the road. I have already applied for permission for the move."
