AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Concentrator at Anyox Making Good; Alice Arm Looks For Big Season; Prince Rupert Power and District Mining

Col. C. T. Crabbs, president of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co., states that the company is constantly looking for new properties and is considering the examination of one now. The company intends to keep in such financial condition, he says, as to be able to acquire new properties without expensive financing. Shipments will commence from the Bonanza mine at Anyox in February and the mine will be worked at ca-

pacity during the summer. Col. Crabbs states that, during the fourth quarter of last year, the WOTERS LIST company sent an appreciable tonnage of one per cent copper ore to the mill at Anyox, upon which the company is making a profit, out that the average grade in the last six months was 1.27 per cent copper. The operating cost of making copper at Anyox is between 7 1-2 and 8 1-2 cents per pound. Earnings of the Granby Co. for the year 1928 will be between \$7 and \$7.50 a share, states Col. Crabbs.

The advent of the Britannia Mining & Smelting Co., Ltd., into the Alice Arm district is conclusive proof that the ore deposits Hazelton. are large and rich enough to undertake development work on a elton. large scale and its success is not doubted by any one in the district.

That Prince Rupert may become more of a centre for the Pay. mining activity of the district in the near future than it has been Telkwa. lin the past seems likely. In connection with the taking over of race. the local power franchise by the Power Corporation of Canada, some interesting reports are heard though so far they have little in the way of official confirmation. It is said that one of the big consumers from the new local plant will be provided by electrification of the railroad it planned to build into the Copper River coal fields. Provision of additional power here, it is Lake. also felt, may lead to the establishment of a smelter some where in the vicinity of the city, before long.

There seems to be little in the nature of encouragement for making of the final payment of \$50,-000 on the Woodbine property at Stewart which falls due in March. Last September there was \$90,-000 in the treasury of the company. This has been reduced at the rate of about \$5,000 per
