## Nationalist Party in South Africa Secures Majority of Assembly

No Longer Dependent On Labor Group to Keep Them in Power, So Movements Being Watched With Interest

CAPETOWN, June 14.—The Nationalist Party, having emerged victorious from the general election Wednesday, the predominant question now is whether Premier Hertzog will form a purely Nationalist Government or continue to co-operate with the five Cresswell-Labor members in another Nationalist-Labor government.

The Nationalists have a majority of two over all parties and are pretty sure to win twelve of the seats yet to be heard from. The present standing is:

Nationalists, 69.  
South African Party, 59.  
Cresswell Laborites, 5.  
National Council Laborites, 3.

The Labor groups sustained a severe defeat. The South African Party is deeply disappointed at the result of the election, as they expected to win.

## WILL SURVEY WATER POWERS

These Cannot Be Given Away But Are All Vested in the Crown

VICTORIA, June 14.—British Columbia water powers will be made the subject of a systematic survey during the next few years, not only in the districts tributary to cities but in the most remote regions. It was announced today by Hon. P. P. Burden, minister of lands.

The minister also stressed that all water powers were still vested in the Crown and "can not be given away."

## CITY AFFAIRS ARE DISCUSSED

Trades & Labor Council Expresses Confidence in Labor Representatives on Civic Board

The Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council, at a meeting last night, engaged in a free and extended discussion of municipal affairs, particularly as regards the public works department, after which the council expressed its continued confidence in labor's representatives on the city council board.

Ald. Macdonald and Ald. Brown gave an explanation of certain municipal conditions as they exist today.

The president reported on satisfactory progress which has been made in connection with organization of a Retail Clerks' Union.

The Electrical Workers' local reported that a new agreement was being drawn up with the Power Corporation of Canada and also with the city.

Copies of pamphlets outlining the work at Ottawa of J. S. Woodsworth, labor member for Winnipeg, will be distributed to delegates.

## THREE KILLED AT VANCOUVER

Two Nurses and Man Met With Fatal Accident on Way to New Westminster

NO WITNESSES NEAR

VANCOUVER, June 14.—Miss Rita Erickson and Miss Myrtle Bennett, nurses at the Besondale mental hospital, and A. M. Campbell, carpenter at the same institution were killed early this morning when the car in which they were driving back to the hospital overturned at the foot of a steep hill at the corner of Grandview Highway and Boundary Road.

There were no witnesses to the accident. Miss Erickson and Campbell were dead when the wrecked car was found and Miss Bennett died in the hospital.

## PROCESSION OF STEAMERS HERE

Three Passenger Liners Arrived in Port in Quick Succession This Morning

There was quite a procession of passenger liners into Prince Rupert harbor around 10 o'clock this morning. First, the Union steamer Cardena, Capt. A. Johnstone, came in, about 10 minutes later the C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Arthur Slater, and within another five minutes the C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. D. Donald. All three boats were from the south and brought a total of about 450 passengers here, mostly tourists.

## WOMEN'S RIGHT TO SEAT IN SENATE IS TO BE HEARD ENGLAND

EDMONTON, June 14.—When the appeal of five Alberta women for an interpretation of the Act of British North America giving them the status of "persons" and thus enabling them to sit in the Canadian senate is heard before the privy council in England on July 2, it will be unopposed by the province of Quebec.

This announcement is welcomed by Alberta women, who for 14 years have watched with interest the fight being waged by Police Magistrate Emily Murphy of this city for the establishment of women as "persons" under the Act of British North America. Quebec was the only province in Canada which offered any opposition to the appeal which has been carried from the Canadian courts to the privy council.

The five Alberta women making the appeal are Magistrate Murphy, Hon. Irene Paribny, minister without portfolio in the Alberta government, Mrs. R. W. McClelland, Mrs. O. C. Edwards of Macleod, and Mrs. L. C. McKinney of Clareholm.

## TURKISH WOMEN WILL FIGHT IN TIME OF WAR

Objection Taken to Being Left Behind Keeping Home Fires Burning

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 14.—Ultra-empowered Turkish women are preparing a revolution to overthrow women's traditional role in time of war. This group, led by a brilliant young member of Stambul's new feminine intelligentsia, Shaziye Hanem, declares that in the next war the enlightened woman of Turkey will not be the theoretical "girl behind the man" but the actual gun.

Shaziye Hanem says that if war falls again upon this generation, she herself will lead into the trenches women who refuse to bear again the intolerable burden of waiting behind the lines. "Keeping the home fires burning when there are only tatters of nerves and shreds of hearts to kindle the flames, is a harder job than soldiering," says this young reformer. "We pray to Allah that there may be no 'next war,' but if there is, we Turkish women who have seen our mothers wither beneath the bitter waiting at home, will never submit to their fate. We will fight in the front lines and die outright rather than have our hearts and minds slowly murdered."

## COMMISSION ON HEALTH INSURANCE

VANCOUVER, June 14.—The Provincial Government's health insurance commission held its opening session here yesterday. W. F. Kennedy of North Okanagan was acting chairman and other members present were Dr. L. E. Borden of Nelson, Dr. J. J. Gillis of Yale, and Thomas Pearson of Nanaimo.

The principal object of the commission as disclosed in questions to witnesses is to ascertain the percentage of salaries that employers should contribute to the funds of the employees' associations, which would distribute the sick benefits when the employees are laid off through illness.

## PLEA CHANGED FROM NOT GUILTY IN JAP LIQUOR SALE CASE

About half way through the hearing of crown evidence this morning in city police court before Magistrate McClymont in the case of G. Hinada of Seal Cove, who is charged with keeping liquor for sale, the defence changed its plea from that of not guilty to guilty. The magistrate then reserved his sentence until tomorrow morning.

E. F. Jones, city solicitor, prosecuted and L. W. Patmore acted for the defence.

## LARGE SHRINE PARTIES HERE

Two Hundred and Fifty Nobles and Wives From Buffalo and Philadelphia Visit City

One hundred and sixty members of Lulu Temple, Buffalo, after attending the recent Imperial Shrine convention in Los Angeles, arrived in the city from the south on the steamer Prince Rupert this morning and after a brief visit here left by special train for the east. The party, including two United States senators and two judges, was headed by H. J. Gould, illustrious potentate, and C. V. Howick, C.N.R. travelling passenger agent, Buffalo, was accompanying the party as official representative of the railway company.

Coming north on the same boat were 80 members of Lulu Temple, Philadelphia, who remained over to have a fish luncheon in the Commodore Cafe and proceeded east by special train at 2 o'clock this afternoon. R. F. McNaughton, C.N.R. district passenger agent here, accompanied this party as far as Jasper Park.

Members of the Shrine parties said they saw the first sunshine here for several days in the course of their trip up the coast. In Vancouver it was very unpleasant from the weather standpoint.

The passenger accommodation of the Prince Rupert was almost entirely taken up with the two parties.

Seal Cove: Total 65, boys 31, girls 34; highest percentage Div. 2 was 98.15.

## EXONERATED OF ANY CRIME
