Macdonald Points To Success of Nationalization in Canada as Lesson to Britain

NEWCASTLE - ON-TYNE, England, May 29-The Labor Party's nationalization proposals formed the subject of an address by Rt Hon. Ramsay Macdonald here last night when he vigorously defended the principal.

The labor leader cited the Canadian National Railways and the Ontario hydro-electric power as among outstanding successful examples of public ownership and asserted that Premier Stanley Baldwin was ill-equipped when he denounced nationalization at the outset of the campaign. In the process of time various industries would pass into the public service! stage, said Mr. Macdonald. Then they would be brought under public control. Municipal gas and water had long ceased to disturb us, but they were really forms of socialism.
