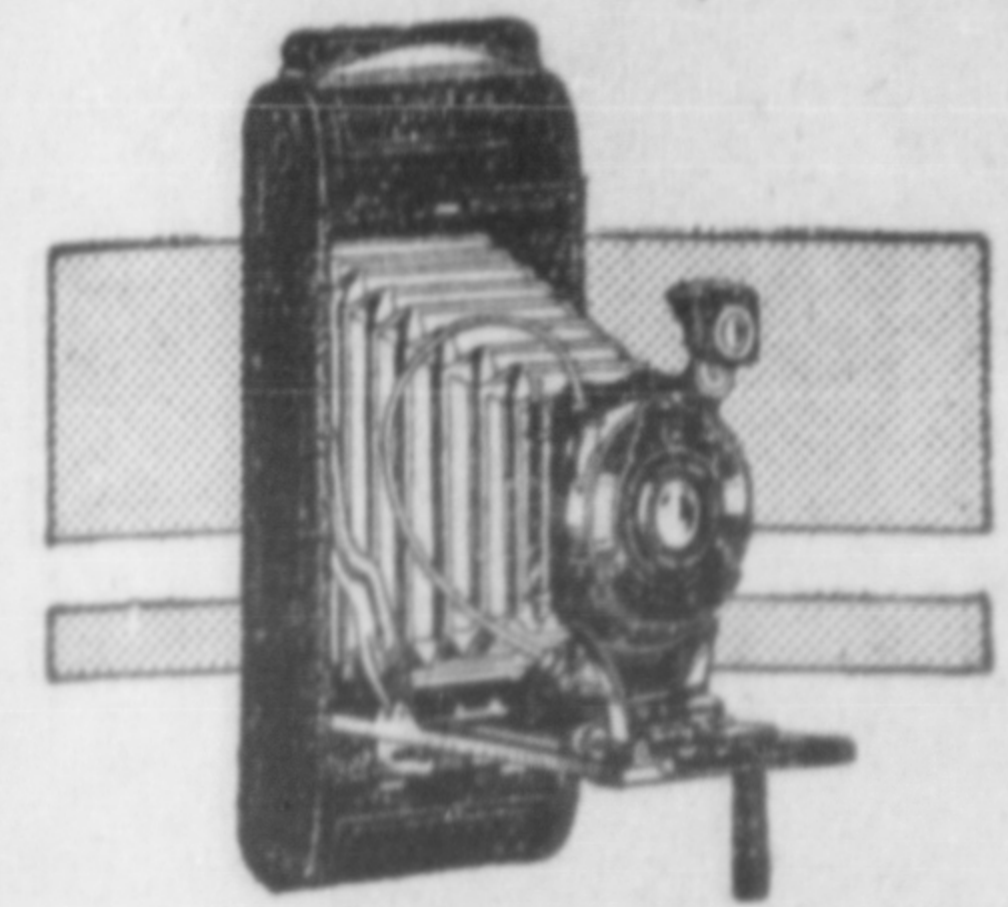

### COTTON STRIKE CONTINUING IN BRITAIN

MANCHESTER, July 31.—Lancashire's cotton mill stoppage has entered its third day with prospects of settlement dimmer than ever. The employers professed still to be ready to negotiate and the card room workers and spinners were apparently ready to meet them, but the powerful weaving branch seems determined to remain adamant against the proposed wage reduction.

Meanwhile the British press comments say the rival cotton firms are taking Britain's trade and Germany, France and Japan are optimistic over the opportunities presented to seize the markets. The French textile mills are working at top speed.

### LOST VESTRIS OVERLOADED

Court Ordered Payment of Five Hundred Pounds Sterling By Agents

LONDON, July 31.—Steamer Vestris, which was lost at sea last November, was overloaded and unfit to encounter the perils of the winter trip. That was part of the findings of the Board of Trade inquiry into the disaster in which 112 lives were lost.

The court declared that the SOS call from the doomed ship should have been sent six hours earlier than it was.

The court sat for 40 days and at the conclusion ordered payment of 500 pounds sterling and costs by David Cook, president of Sanderson & Son of New York, agent for the line operating the vessel. The finding concluded: "There was no lack of order among the crew."
