## RED SHIELD CAMPAIGN

Salvation Army to Make Their Drive for Funds Last Three Days of Next Week.

Arrangements are well under way for the Salvation Army Red Shield campaign. It has now been decided to appeal for funds on Thursday, Friday and Saturday next when it is hoped that the people of this city will raise the sum of \$2,000 asked for as Prince Rupert's quota of the million dollar fund.

The money will be spent in carrying on the work among the men who are still overseas and in the solution of the many problems associated with those who have returned.

At present a chain of hostels for naval and military men are being operated in all the large cities between Halifax and Victoria. There are also convalescent homes in the old country. Army ambulances are still working in the hospital areas of France.

The Red Shield campaign has been endorsed by kings, military and naval officers and the local G. W. V. A. have promised a team to assist in the campaign.
