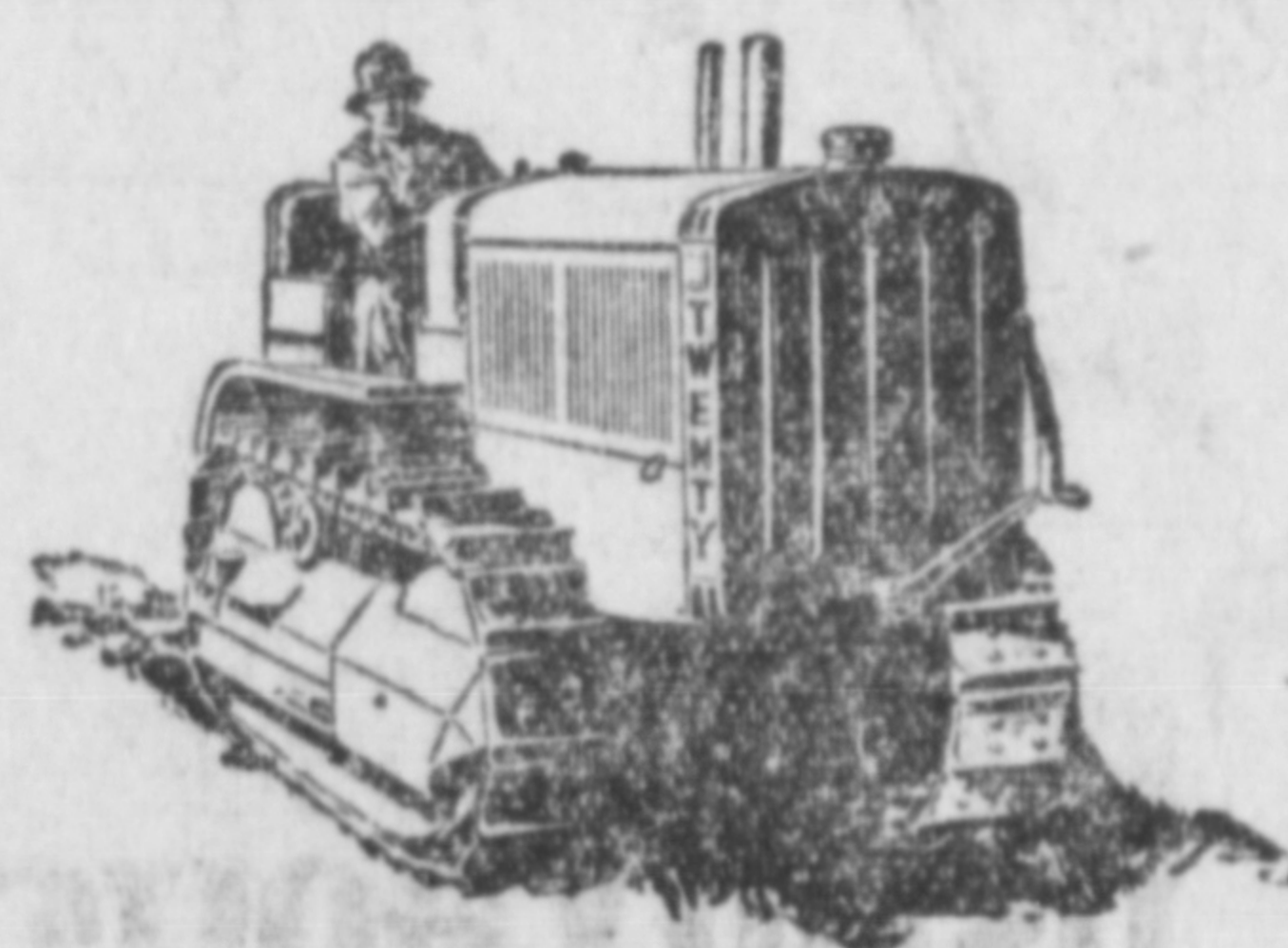

GIRLS TAKE CHARGE OF CHURCH SERVICE

C.G.I.T. at First United Church Yesterday Morning; T. J. Shenton Speaker in Evening

In the absence of the minister, Rev. Alfred Wilson, who is attending conference in Vancouver, more than twelve Canadian Girls in Training conducted a successful service yesterday morning in First United Church. The girls opened the service by ritual, repeating their purpose and reciting in unison the standard C. G. I. T. poem "A Girl." Miss Linnea Hanson sang sweetly and Miss Elliott, the deaconess, rendered acceptably "The Sparrow Song," and also related the story of "Mary King" and "A Mother Wanted." The service was closed with the regular C.G.I.T. ritual.

In the evening, the service was conducted by T. J. Shenton who took as his subject "I am the Resurrection and the Life"

PUREST MILK IN EXISTENCE

Proposal to Market in Prince Rupert Product of Certified Dairy

At the dinner given by W. F. Jones, manager of the Brooksbank certified milk dairy at Lulu Island, the whole system of securing certified milk was discussed. In the first place, it was stated that to present the dairy was not a commercial success. It was started four years ago and was not paying dividends. The returns were in improved health for the community, especially among babies. In order to give a milk that was pure and practically free from bacteria it was necessary to charge more for it as for the ordinary milk. That necessarily limited the demand. The babies at the Vancouver General Hospital were fed on it all the time.

Mr. Jones stated that there were only four certified milk stations in Canada. Two of these were in Winnipeg, one at Toronto, and the other near Vancouver.

Telling of the conditions of production, it was claimed that the buildings were of concrete and steel, and no other animals, not even rats or mice, were allowed on the farm. Dogs and cats were excluded. They milked 63 cows out of a herd of 90. A veterinary inspected the herd every fortnight and sometimes oftener and the udders of the cows were tested. Also, there were tests for T.B. and abortion. A superior class of help had to be engaged and they had to undergo medical tests. The cows were all washed before each milking from the shoulders back, and the udders washed with rain just before milking. The milkers wore clean white suits, washed daily, and the milk was chilled and bottled directly it came from the cows.

Eighty per cent of the milk was sold under doctors' prescriptions. The milk has so few bacteria that it will keep a very long time. A test had been made in sending bottles to Manila in the Philippines and back and the milk was quite sweet on being opened at Vancouver eight weeks later. A supply had been taken by a lady taking a baby to England. She was six weeks on the way and on arrival had two bottles left in which the milk was perfectly sweet. The idea was not to kill the bacteria, but to prevent them getting into the milk.

The milk is not pasteurized nor treated in any manner, but is the natural product of the cow. It is proposed to market a limited amount of this milk in Prince Rupert, possibly through a local merchant.

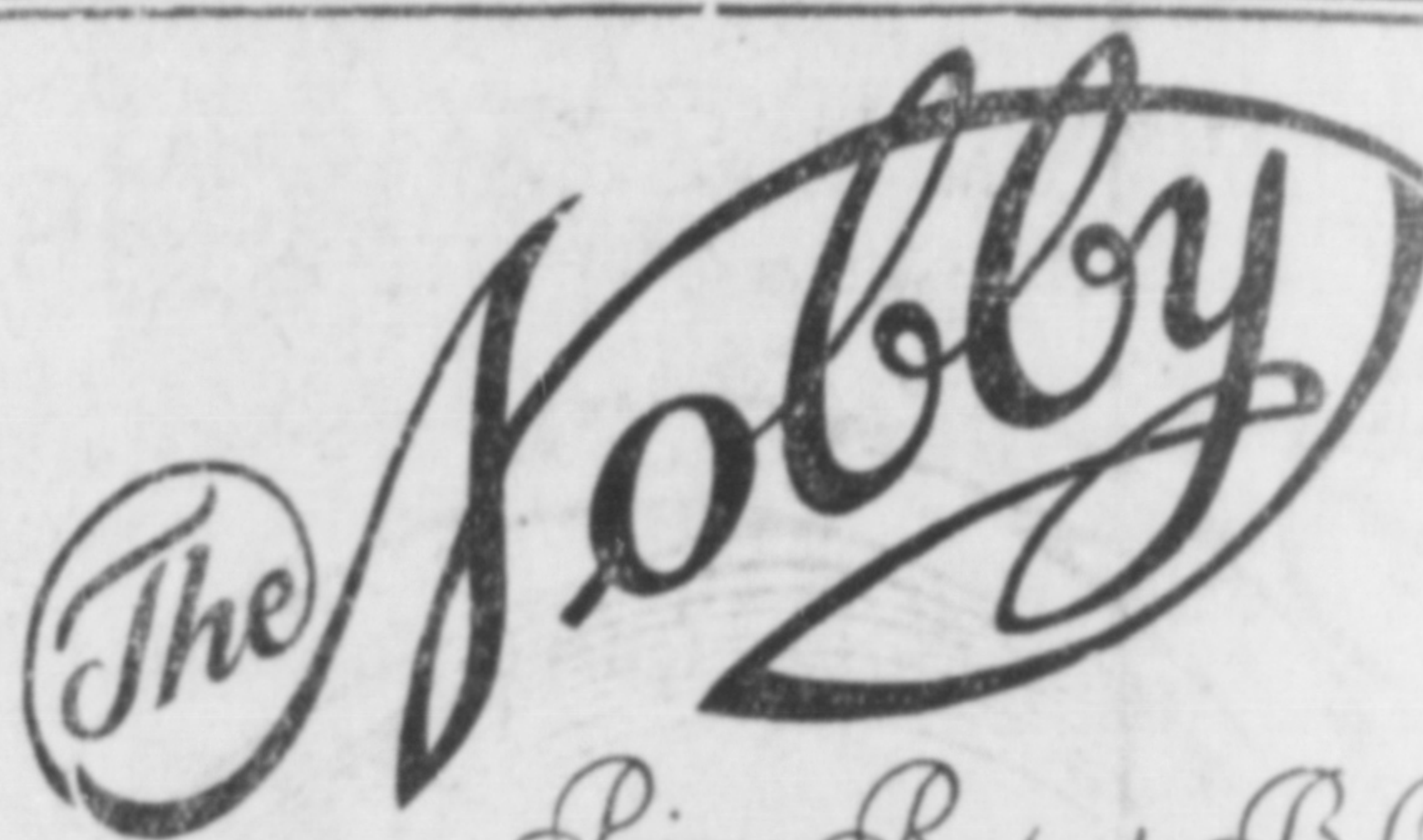

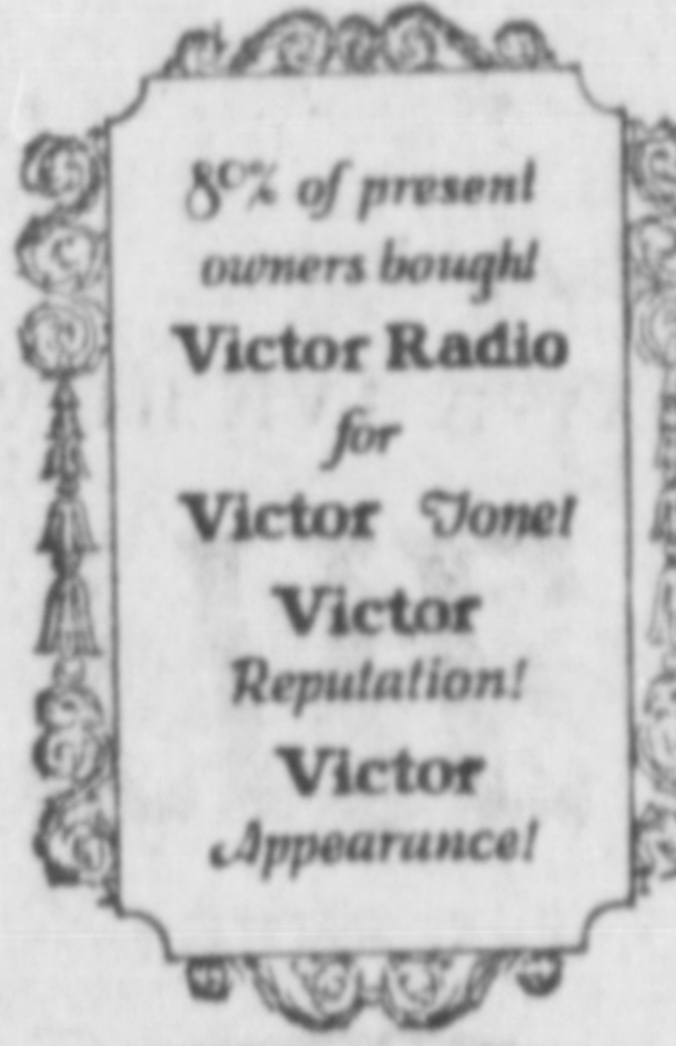
