UNITED STATES NEW CURRENCY

G. C. Woodward, American consul, has been notified that on or after July 1 the United States government will issue a new smaller size paper currency. This new currency will be put in circulation gradually as the old size becomes worn or unfit for circulation and the old size currency will remain a valid obligation at all times. There is, therefore, no time limit within which paper currency of the United States now in use must be exchanged for the new paper currency to be issued.

California Collegians Under Direction of Brick Morse Capitol Theatre Tonight

Appearing at the Capitol Theatre tonight, tomorrow and Friday will be Brick Morse's California Collegians, a troupe composed of students of the University of California, formerly known as the University of California Glee Club, and under the direction of Brick Morse, veteran director of thirty years' standing. The Collegians will be remembered as having appeared in Prince Rupert on several occasions, the last being in the summer of 1927. In

former appearances here they have always made a big hit, and this year's show will prove to be no exception. Each summer the Collegians make an extended tour of several months, combining business with pleasure. Thus in 1926 they toured the Orient, in 1927 the Northwest, last summer the eastern part of the United States and Europe. The Collegians' presentation consists of a male chorus of twenty voices, a ten-piece band and a variety of good, snappy dancing, singing, comedy and novelty acts presented by various members of the troupe. So varied is their program that it is sure to please a variety of tastes and it is presented with so much youthful pep and enthusiasm that there is never a dull minute.

NO PROFIT TO GAIN WORLD AND LOSE SOUL

Manufacturers' President Urges Quality in Immigration Favors Technical Education

HALIFAX, N.S., June 5:—Quality, not quantity, should be the guiding principle in immigration, declared L. W. Simms, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, in his review at the annual meeting of the association which opened yesterday. Mr. Simms said one of the mottoes that might very profitably be kept before the country was, "What shall it profit Canada if she gain the whole world and lose her own soul?" No nation, he declared, had so fine an opportunity to build into its human stock the best physical, mental and spiritual life that the world had ever known, this by a process of assimilation that conserved and elevated the high ideals in our native citizenship and imparted these ideals to those selected newcomers whose traditions were not too far removed from our own to prevent their thus adding to our total strength.

Referring to the prominent place taken by the C.M.A. in the promotion of technical education, with its result in an unprecedented per capita production in Canada, he pointed out that whatever such education might have lacked in cultural curricula, it was inevitably laying the only practical foundation for the economic freedom without which no widespread true culture was attainable. Many were, however, becoming more concerned that, in leading groups into greater efficiency in making a living, there should be greater clearness as to what we were really living for. Education was life, not alone in the school, but beyond, and in this connection he quoted Roger Babson: "We are giving too much time to teaching the incidentals of life and too little to teaching the fundamentals of life. As young people are given more material, political and intellectual power, they must have more spiritual power to correspond, or civilization gets top-heavy and out of balance."

As to the work of the League of Nations, Mr. Simms claimed that exactly the same principles of intercourse and acquaintance that were so evidently essential to national accord must operate in the League if they were to exert any important influence to wards world peace. Also, the League's influence for peace would be in proportion to the righteousness that characterized its members.

If "independence" was the catchword when the United States huddled into nationhood, "inter-dependence" was the foundation stone on which Canada was being built, Mr. Simms continued. In this word Canadians

had no limiting, isolating conception, but one which, applied in the home made better citizens of the community; applied in the community, better fitted for the responsibility of nationhood, and applied in the nation made the people more worthy to participate in affairs of the Empire and of the world itself.

Concluding on a high note, Mr. Simms said: "The only outstanding democracies, with one exception, that have survived today are those cradled in the British stock. This is not because Britain is the Mother of Parliaments but because so many of her sons came nearer than any other people since the earliest Christian era in applying the teachings of Christ to their individual lives and their daily affairs and in their sacrificial application discovered them to be the most profound principles of economics ever laid down for human guidance."

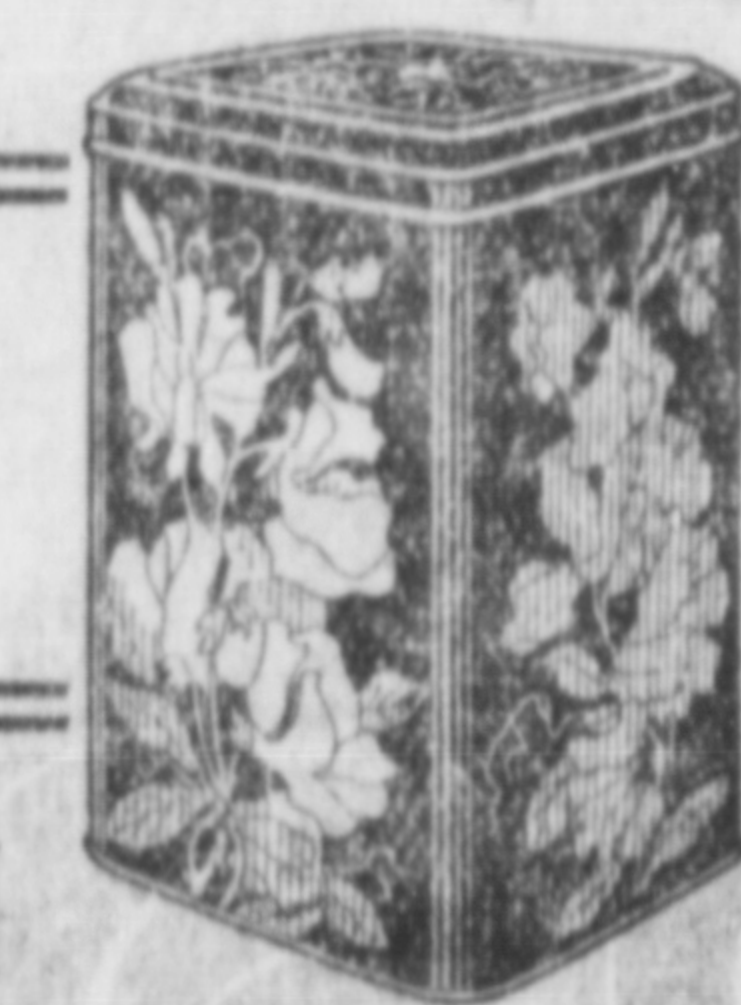
