Preparing Plans for Naval Disarmament To be at Conference

LONDON, June 26.—Premier Ramsay Macdonald announced last night that he had talked with United States Ambassador Dawes and the United States ambassador to Belgium, Hugh Gibson, and that he hoped before many days they would be in a position to make a definite announcement of how negotiations for naval disarmament are to be carried on.

Among matters concerning which the premier said a definite announcement would be made was where the conference was to be held and the objects to be aimed at in the conference.

LONDON, June 26.—United States Ambassador Dawes last night told a gathering at a dinner for overseas delegates to the fourth biennial conference of the British Empire Service League that his chief instructions from President Hoover had been to promote comradeship as opposed to force as the arbiter between nations.

TO INVESTIGATE FOREST WEALTH

Conference Being Held at Ottawa Today to Deal With Subject

OTTAWA, June 26.—The federal and provincial governments of the Dominion are cooperating for the purpose of taking an inventory of Canada's forest resources.

New Province Suggestion to Be Before Convention of the Associated Boards Tomorrow

The convention of the Associated Boards of Trade which opens here tomorrow will deal with the proposed new province in some form or other.

"Whereas there is a growing belief amongst the people of that portion of the province of British Columbia lying approximately north of the 52nd parallel of latitude that: 'A fair or reasonable proportion of the revenue derived by the Government from that section of the province has not at any time within the last twenty years been expended in the development of such section.'

DIVER TRYING SECURE GOLD FROM ISLANDER

JUNEAU, June 26.—Efforts were started here yesterday by Captain H. Finch, diver of Seattle, to recover between \$100,000 and \$600,000 in gold reported to have been in the safe of the steamer Islander, which crashed into an iceberg and foundered south of Douglas Island 28 years ago.

Hon. W. S. Fielding Honored in Death by Many at His Funeral

OTTAWA, June 26.—A carillon from the Peace Tower this afternoon pealed forth the notes of funeral hymns as a great procession of men prominent in Canada's national affairs moved slowly up Metcalfe Street and along Wellington following the remains of the Dominion's distinguished statesman, W. S. Fielding, to its last resting place in Beechwood cemetery.

There was a private service at the Fielding residence on Sandy Hill at 2 o'clock, after which the cortege proceeded to the First Baptist Church on Elgin Street.

One figure among the honor pall-bearers was particularly marked. It was that of Sir William Mulock of the "cabinet of talents" which Sir Wilfrid Laurier formed in 1896.

CANADA BUYS WESTERN UNION

Completes System by Purchasing All Lines in Maritimes

MONTREAL, June 26.—Commencing with July 1, the Canadian National Telegraphs will acquire and operate the complete land mileage of Western Union Telegraphs in the Maritime Provinces of Canada.

At the present time, Canadian National Telegraphs have 150,000 miles of wire in service and they operate 1943 telegraph offices within the Dominion.
