Heavy Losses in Marginal Trading As Brokers Attempt to Protect Themselves

VANCOUVER, Oct. 26.-There were heavy losses of paper profits in marginal trading on the Vancouver Stock Exchange yesterday afternoon, prices being forced down even further as brokers attempted to protect themselves at any cost. Liquidation of oil stocks was particularly heavy while mining issues held up better under

The situation generally is very unsettled and the bear movement may continue for a time.

### Private Radio Chains Banned Alaska Dec. 31

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26:-The ending of the system of independent private radio communication chains in Alaska has been ruled by the radio commission to take place after December 31. The only licenses the commission will grant for point to point coastal services in the territory and its waters will be given to public service communication companies.

### Fish Shipment Goes From Victoria Cold Storage Plant

VICTORIA, Oct 26. — The first shipment of fish from the Victoria cold storage to Europe left Victoria on the Royal Mail Steam Packet steamship Loch Katrine. The shipment, which is a trial one, is being shipped to Rotterdam.

The Loch Katrine took out eleven cases in her refrigerator holds. In the shipment were 123 steelhead salmon, caught off the west coast of Vancouver Island and packed and processed at the cold storage plant here. Altogether the eleven cases contain 1616 pounds of fish.
