Proceeded to Alaska Yesterday Afternoon After Refuelling Here

Another fine flight was being made by the Gorst Air Transport Co.'s Boeing amphibian biplane which made a brief stop here yesterday afternoon to refuel. The ship, an eight passenger carrier and one of the largest airplanes that has ever been een here, left Seattle at 6:45 esterday morning, arrived at ampbell River at 9:15 and, afer refuelling there, hopped off again at 10:15 and arrived here it 2:40. The flight had been nade in six hours and fifty-five minutes actual flying time. The hip spent about an hour here before proceeding to Ketchikan.
