Extend Welcome To the Minister.

Prince Rupert will extend a hearty welcome to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. No matter what political opinions citizens may hold, this is not the time to show them. For the time being Mr. Ballantyne is a minister of the crown and he is the one that is most intimately connected with the commercial life of this city. For that reason, if for no other, we shall get together and give him a welcome and help him to make his administration of the department effective.

Prince Rupert is bound to be of interest to the Minister of Fisheries for this is the port where most of the west coast fishing is done. It is the one port, above all others, that must be in close touch with the department of fisheries.

Recently the Board of Trade expressed itself very strongly at the lack of interest taken by the Provincial Commissioner of Fisheries in the premier business of this port. Possibly it was somewhat lax in not asking to meet the minister in regard to questions in which the board was interested. If it had suggested doing so, doubtless Mr. Sloan would have been only too glad to discuss departmental matters.

It is satisfactory to note that the board is taking a different course in regard to the Dominion department, which after all is the one that matters, for the fisheries are under Dominion control. It has asked the fishermen of the district to express opinions on several vital subjects and the result of the replies will be laid before the minister.

Great Britain and Labor Troubles.

Great Britain still has her labor troubles. The bakers have gone back to work, so the people will be able to eat wholesome food once more, but the miners of Yorkshire, to the number of close on a quarter of a million, are still idle. There are other little matters not yet settled in that country, but on the whole the situation generally has improved. The great trouble is the high cost of living, a subject that has baffled all the statesmen of the world.

Much Interest in Building Question.

Much interest is being taken in the question of building restrictions and their enforcement. Some take the stand that no restrictions are necessary while others insist that the city should take a hand in seeing that the work is done properly. It is certain that in the past there has been a good deal of laxity in regard to the taking out of permits and many buildings are put up in an improper manner. The appointment of the building inspector should be the means of rectifying these little difficulties.

Synopses of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timbered.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint record.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate Certificate of Improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if the requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements, residence and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of the person who formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Interest on return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions, town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchaser does not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Sub-purchasers may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
