Fishermen's Floats Contract Awarded To John Currie & Son; To Be Finished by March Next

aid John Currie & Son of this city have been awarded the contract by the federal department of public works for the construction of the new fishermen's floats just east of the drydock at this part, it was announced last night. It will be impossible to get the necessary material here before Christmas, so a start cannot be made until then at the earliest. The contractors hope to complete the job in March.

The contract calls for 1120 lineal feet of floats which will be fourteen feet wide and divided into several sections. There will also be a short approach and a gangway to connect the floats and the approach.

It is understood that the Pacific Stevedoring Co. was the only other tenderer on the job. The contract figure is not stated.

The new floats will take the place of the old provincial government floats at Cow Bay which have long since proven inadequate and which originally were built only as a temporary expedient. F or years the federal department of public works has been urged to provide the new floats.
