CONSTRUCTION NEW MILL PORPOISE HARBOR GOES AHEAD

Both Premier Mackenzie King: SEVENTY CENTS TO and Leader of Opposition Are in: Accord Supporting Peace Pact

Briand-Kellogg Pact Is One of Many Paths Leading In Direction of Peace, Declares Premier Mackenzie King in Commons

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—There is no royal road to peace, but there are many paths which lead in that direction, and the Briand-Kellogg pact is one of the paths. In this sentence Premier Mackenzie King defined for the benefit of the house of commons yesterday the treaty for the renunciation of war signed at Paris last summer. Yesterday he moved that the commons register its approval of the treaty.

The treaty, the premier said, did not pretend to estabish machinery for the prevention of war, but it called for each nation of the world's sole solemn renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy.

Support of the treaty, coupled with a note of warning that there must be disarmament if peace was to be more than a dream, was the burden of the speech with which Hon. R. B. Bennett followed Premier Mackenzie King.
