

The physical difficulties of constructing and assembling the mill machinery were tremendous, owing to the 13-mile haul over a timbered site which had to be cleared and blasted. As many as 65 to 75 men were employed for months in the hauling, clearing, excavation and construction

Today the result is that the company's efforts are rewaitded by Lorge, Gled today. the completion of a modern 75-ton flotation concentration mill, all electrically driven by two larg diesel engines and generators. A soon as the mill becomes thoroughly tuned up, this promises to be one of the steadiest and longest producers of the north. On account of its low capitalization, the property is expected to make a net return equal to the amount of its entire capital to its shareholders. The ore bodies are rich for mill teed, averaging \$30 per ton, and are pronounced by all geologists as a true fissure vein and with ample ground for extension. It is expected that the Silver Cup will prove one of the wonder mines of the north and a rich reward to its enterprising developers, many of whom have been or are closely connected with Prince Rupert and district.
