

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 28.—Dan M. Farrelly, aged 36 and single, president of the Westminster Construction Company, and an unidentified woman, probably about 22 years of age, were drowned some time between Saturday and Sunday afternoon when an automobile driven by Farrelly went into a ditch containing five feet of water on the Dewdney truck road, 10 miles east of New Westminster.
