Canada Will Answer United States Tariff by Increasing Trade With the Rest of British Empire

Unofficial Despatch From Ottawa Says Next Election in MINISTER LOST 1931 Will Be Fought On Imperial Preference

TORONTO, June 15 .- A despatch to the Toronto Star, Liberal, from Ottawa yesterday says: "Free trade within the British Empire is said to be the answer of Canada's Liberal Government to repeated tariff increases of the United States and to the charge of the Conservative party that Canada is accepting these discriminatory tariffs satisfactory. without retaliation.

GERMAN WILL MAKE "A general election in 1931 is now understood to be contemplated. This will be fought on the question of Imperial preference and Canadians will be encouraged to buy within the Empire rather than from the United

"The election will be preceded by certain cabinet changes. Hon. W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture, will probably go to the lieutenant-governorship of Saskatchewan and a Saskacthewan Progressive will succeed him.
