# British Empire May Join World Court at Macdonald's Request

LONDON, June 25.-Important negotiations affecting Empire affairs are reported to have been indicated put a stop to the modern rustling by the Labor Government of Great Britain. It has communicated with the Dominions in an effort to gain an agreement on the signing of an optional clause of world court statutes under which questions of international law would be submitted to a permanent court of international justice at the Hague.

> The Labor newspaper, the Daily Herald, today said the Government had also informed the Dominion Governments it proposes to resume diplomatic relations with Russia.

> Australia hitherto was the only Dominion reluctant to sign the optional clause of the world court statutes and it is understood this reluctance has now been removed to a great extent. In any event, Premier Macdonald is hopeful of being able to show complete Empire agreement on joining the world court when he visits the League of Nations assembly in September.
