City Solicitor Jones explained that the proposal was that the railway company should transfer waterfront outside of Cow Bay to the provincial government, which would, in turn, transfer the land inside Cow Bay to the railway company. The city was to receive 200 feet of waterfront just west of Cow Bay and approximately whete the fishermen's floats were row located from the provincial government. The transfer, while ratified by the ratepayers, had never as yet been finally passed upon by the council. The city formerly had riparian rights in Cow Bay though owning lots there which had subsequently been transferred to the Power Corporation. As matters now stand, the city actually had no rights and endorsation of the filling in of Cow Bay was but a mere

formality. Ald. Rudderham said he would have no objection if the whole of Cow Bay was filled in. He did not aprove, however, of merely the bridge fill being made and leaving the present disgraceful cesspool inside. He felt that the council should move cautiously in the matter as Cow Bay was now considerable of a convenience to the fishing fleet. It should be assured that suitable accomodation would be provided elsewhere." Ald. Collart thought the intention was to fill in all of Cow Bay.
