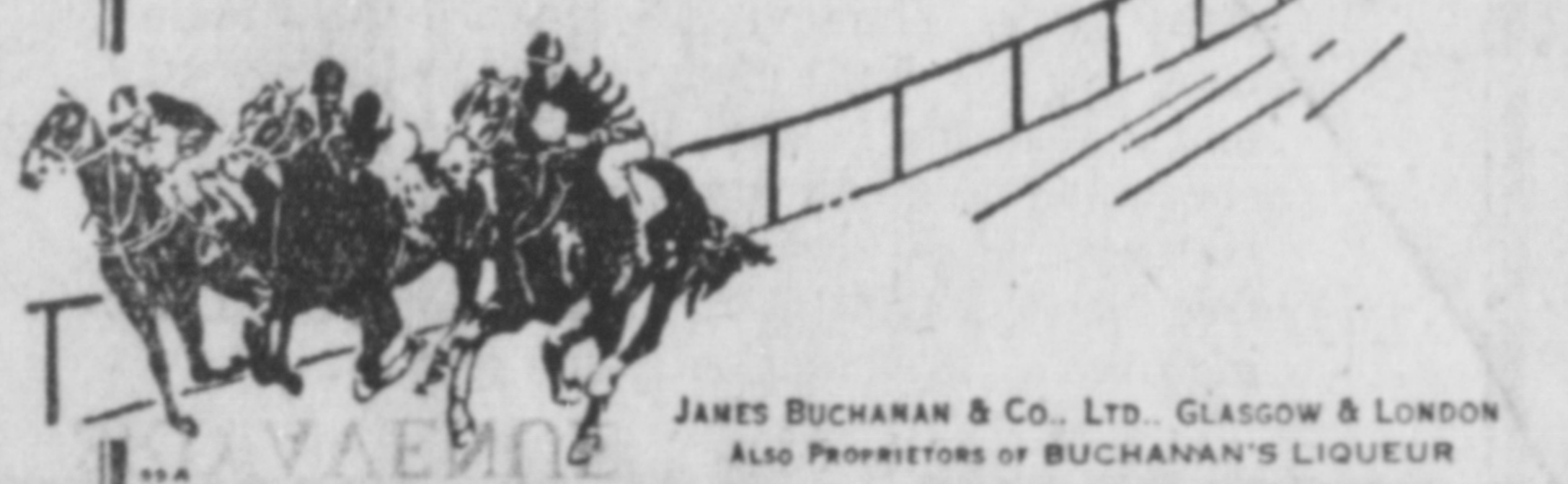

STAR TELLS ABOUT WORK OF DAWSON

The tragic accident that cost Frederick George Dawson his life deprives Prince Rupert of a pioneer citizen who, while he built up a large and flourishing business, found time to devote himself energetically to the advancement of the community, says the Vancouver Star in an editorial article.

The story of the late Mr. Dawson is that of many other Canadians who by their own energy and perseverance have fought their way to important positions in commercial and public life. Born in a small Ontario town in 1876, he held successively a number of subordinate posts in business houses, working gradually west, through Regina, Winnipeg and Calgary, until in 1906 he opened his own office in this city.

Vancouver did not hold him long, however. Two years later Prince Rupert became established as the terminal of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and Mr. Dawson was quick to see the opportunity presented there. He established a wholesale grocery business which became one of the leading concerns of its kind in that part of British Columbia. Only the other day, W. H. Malkin and Co., of this city, concluded an amalgamation by which F. G. Dawson, Limited, became part of the larger organization.

Mr. Dawson was a very active member of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, of which he became president in 1913. He was also a promoter of the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association, his fellow-directors honoring him with the presidency. An enthusiastic Rotarian, he took a large part in the activities of that body.

It was in recognition of his wide knowledge of western conditions that a few years ago he was appointed a director of the Canadian National Railway, a position which he filled with his usual zeal and ability. Sadly enough, it was a misadventure on the tracks of that railway that cost him his life.

He always responded to calls for help whether it might be personal services or money. His loyalty and charity were well known. He was charitable to all with whom he came in contact and no one ever heard him say an unkind word about another.

President Bryant ordered a copy of the resolution to be forwarded to Mrs. Dawson and announced that he had already ordered a wreath to be sent from the club.
