C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. D. Donald, with a full list of tourist passengers on board, arrived in port at 12 noon today from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Skagway and other Alaska ports whence she will return here Monday morning at 10:30 and sail at 4 p.m. that day for the south.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Alice, Capt. Thomas Cliff, is due in port at 4 o'clock this afternoon from Skagway and will sail at 5 p.m. for Vancouver and Victoria. The vessel is expected to bring in an overflow of passengers from Ketchikan awaiting transportation outside who will remain here until Friday night and proceed south on the Princess Mary.

There were some 225 passengers aboard the steamer Prince Rupert which is in port today bound from Vancouver to Skagway. Of these, 174 are going through to make the trip to Alaska.

After a two months' trip to the Arctic Ocean beyond Wrangell Island with two young scientists of Chicago Museum of Natural History who were in quest of various specimens of northern animal life, the well known halibut schooner Dorothy, Capt. Ole Hvatum, spent yesterday in port bound for Seattle. During the trip, forty walrus and six polar bears were shot and several walrus and bear carcasses as well as a quantity of ivory were being taken south on the boat.

After her arrival at Seattle the Dorothy will go out on a salmon packing charter, and it is expected will be again used by the international fisheries commission in research work on the halibut grounds during the winter.
