## MAY REPAIR DORIC AT LOCAL DRYDOCK

This is Considered Likely in Connection With Wrecked Halibut Schooner

It is considered likely that repairs to the American halibut schooner Doric, which was wrecked on Kinahan Island last week, will be carried out at the local dry dock where the vessel is now on the pontoons. No announcement to this effect, however, has yet been made by the underwriters who have now taken the vessel over. To tow the boat to Seattle for repairs would be quite costly and would also take time.

Pending decision as to what is to be done in the matter of repairs, Capt. O. B. Hanney and Martin Nelson, owners of the Doric, are remaining in the city.
