Mass arrests, beatings and torture of Soviet citizens is said to have become a daily occurrence.



Minister of Customs Declares Canada Willing to Do Her Share to Prevent by Keeping Canadians Out of the Business

OTTAWA, July 26.—"Canada is quite willing to keep Canadians out of the business of running liquor into the United States," Hon. W. D. Euler stated yesterday, in outlining offers designed to assist Americans in stamping out liquor running from Canada. "Moreover," the minister stated, "if the United States authorities wil insist on clearance for their own boats to enable them to check and control their own people and the violation of their own laws, the Canadian Government is quite ready to consider any further reasonable -measure of co-operation with DEVELOPCOAL
