CROW CHIEF LAID AWAY

The Funeral of Amos Collinson Took Place at Kitkatla on Friday, Over 70

At Kitkatla on Wednesday, December 4, there passed away Amos Collinson, the chief of the Crow Tribe of Indians. He was over seventy years of age. He was laid on a bed of sickness for only one week. His end was peaceful. The whole Reserve had watched and ministered patiently during the brief sickness with many anxious hearts.

The funeral took place on Friday afternoon, December 6, in the Anglican Church at Kitkatla. An impressive ceremony took place, the service being conducted ably by Bert Shearman, teacher and missionary at Kitkatla, who gave an address, and was assisted by Matthias Shaw.

After the service, the body was taken by boats to the graveyard on an island about a mile distant, and respectfully interred, the Kitkatla band, conducted by H. Brown, played appropriate music.

The deceased will be missed very much, as he was noted for his kindness and good fellowship.

He leaves two sons and two daughters, besides a widow who mourns his loss, Henry Collinson, Peter Collinson, Mrs. Vickers and Mrs. Wilson.

Among the chief mourners were Chief Gamble, Stephen Ridley, Solomon Brown, Job Suencer, J. Wilson, William Lewis, H. Watt, David Gladstone, Chief Zabased, Oswald Tolmie, Jacob Shaw, Jacob Aster, Stephen Ridley and Casper Gordon.

In memoriam to his dear father's wishes, Henry Collinson, beside other kindly acts, has sent twenty dollars to the funds of each of the following: Prince Rupert Cathedral, Metlakatla Church, Kincolith Church and the United Church at Port Simpson.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Mary, Capt. Anderson, is due in port at 8 o'clock this evening from the south and will sail at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

SMITHERS

The Duthie Mines Ltd. has closed a deal for the purchase of the Charlton - Mark Hanna estate group of claims adjoining the Duthie. Reports from the Duthie are more promising now than they have been for some time. In fact, it is stated that the outlook for the property was never better than it is at present.

Reports reaching here from the Owen Lake mine state that the long cross-cut channel being driven as part of a \$250,000 program of development work, has reached the first vein on the Wrench property. At the point encountered the vein is said to be eighteen feet wide with values in copper and gold.

Charles Wilson of Lake Kathryn has again been given the contract to put up ice for the Canadian National Railways on this division the contract covering requirements at divisional points between McBride and Pacific. Approximately 150 cars will be required to move this ice which amounts to 5,000 tons. Mr. Wilson will also take 4,000 tons of ice for the Booth Fisheries sheds at Lake Kathryn. Cutting of ice will start as soon as it is of sufficient thickness.

OBJECT TO HIGH COST SIDEWALK

A petition is being signed by property owners on the east side of Third Avenue, between Thompson's Hardware and McBride, protesting against the construction of the concrete sidewalk there. One of the property owners interviewed today said:

"The block extends from Fulton Street to McBride, but the City Council authorized the east part of it to be paved as far as the alley. Then another easy section was constructed, leaving only a few lots to pay for filling the big hole farther down. The result is that the cost is to be about fifty dollars a lot for twenty feet. This is much too costly. As the other part has been done in small sections, the next section should be as far as Brooksbank's big and then the remainder will have to be either wooden sidewalk or the city will have to help with the cost."
