NELSON, Sept. 9.—The prosecution of 128 Doukhobors, members of the Sons of Freedom sect, on charges of indecent exposure, resulting from their nude parade on the highway at South Slocan on August 29, was completed Saturday afternoon, when 103 were convicted, sixteen dismissed, and the charges against nine withdrawn.

After the trials the court adjourned and, upon resuming session in camera, the convicted Doukhobors were brought up in groups of five and each sentenced to six FORTY-SECOND months' imprisonment at Okalla jail with hard labor and
