Yet in one important respect Canadian standards are much higher than standards in Britain. Directors in Britain usually enjoy very fat emoluments and often take advantage of opportunity to benefit personally at the expense of the general run of shareholders. If any Canadian board of directors received annual fees such as the directors of Mond Nickel received prior to the recent merger it would constitute a scandal.


