John Kenneth Leveson Ross of Montreal is best known today for his interest in horse breeding. He owns a fine racing stable which has brought him in many valuable trophies.

Identified with big business today and a director of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Dominion Bridge Co., the Lake of the Woods Milling Co. and other large concerns, Mr. Ross, during his years at McGill University took a great interest in all forms of athletics and was a prominent member of the McGill football team when it was the premier collegiate aggregation in Canada.

Mr. Ross was born at Lindsay Ont., on March 31, 1876. A few years ago he visited Prince Rupert with E. W. Beatty K. C. Formerly he was active as a president, and party of C.P.R. directors.
