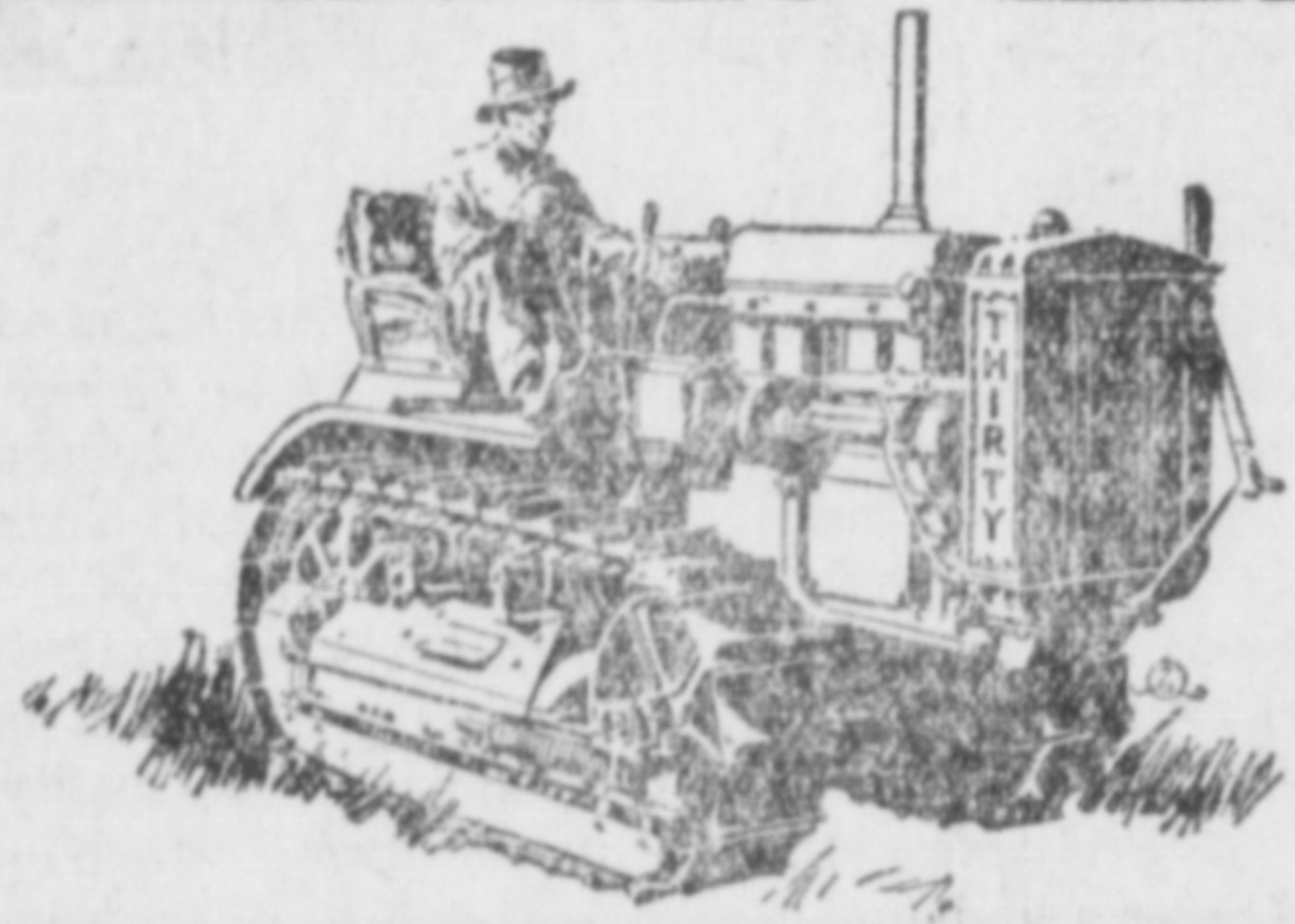

Ernest Hand, Smithers contractor, arrived in the city on yesterday afternoon's train from the interior, being called here for jury duty at the Assizes.

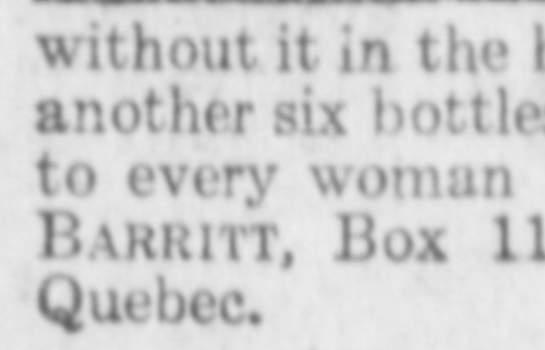

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES IN

OTTAWA, June 4.—Supplementary estimates of more than twelve million dollars were tabled in the House of Commons last night by Hon. J. A. Robb, minister of finance, including \$4,000,000 to complete reparations. The list also includes \$80,000 to subsidize steamship service to Australia.

The estimates also provided an appropriation of \$15,000 to assist in providing pre-cooling warehouse facilities in British Columbia.

WOOD FAVORS GRAIN MIXING

CALGARY, June 4.—Testifying before Saskatchewan Royal Grain Commissioners today, H. W. Wood, chairman of the board of directors of the Alberta Wheat Pool and president of the United Farmers of Alberta, surprised commissioners by stating he was not opposed to mixing properly supervised to secure a uniform out turn. He said the chief cause of dissatisfaction among producers was the complete loss of confidence in the machinery for administration of Canadian grain due to lack of understanding among farmers, himself included, of the intrinsic value of grades.
