## Annual Derby Classic to be Run Tomorrow Epsom Downs Course

Huge Sums Are Wagered on Turf Classic Which Will Be Watched by Quarter of a Million People

EPSOM, June 4.—The Epsom Downs Derby, the annual classic of the turf, will be run tomorrow, when thirty of England's choicest three-year-olds will battle for the honor and glory awarded the winner of the world's best horses.

Five million people have wagered hundreds of thousands of pounds in the gigantic London Stock Exchange and Calcutta sweepstakes and similar pools. The Calcutta and Stock Exchange sweeps alone amount to a combined volume of five million dollars, and the holders of the winning horses in each will receive in the neighborhood of \$625,000.

More than a quarter of a million people are expected to attend the race.

Betting quotations have made Lord Astor's Cragador the popular choice at 6 to 1 against with Lord Derby's Hunter's Moon 7 to 1 and Major McCalmont's Mr. Jinks 17 to 1. Hunter's Moon lost some popularity last week when he pulled up after a short workout with sore shins.

## BRADY URGES EXTENSION OF COMMUNICATION

Draws Attention of Ottawa to Need of Better Mail, Telegraph and Telephone System

OTTAWA, June 4.—Urging construction of a telephone system throughout northern parts of British Columbia not at present served with such communication, J. C. Brady, member for Skeena, before the House, in committee of supply yesterday, pointed out that the tri-weekly mail service and telegraph system was not sufficient to serve the needs of the rapidly expanding mineral and agricultural country. He asked for a survey with a view to developing the telephone network for the Omineca and Skeena districts.

Minister of Public Works Elliott promised the matter would be investigated.

## TEACHER IN ARCTIC LOST HER LIFE AS RESULT OF PLEURISY

POINT BARROW, June 3.—Radio, which so often saved lives in distress in sections of the far north, failed to save Mrs. Ben Egan, Wainwright school teacher. She died of pleurisy, the second victim since the Arctic coast lost its only doctor early this year.

Point Barrow teachers rushed medicines to Wainwright, while instructions for her care were radioed by the physician at Kotzebue.

The woman's husband will continue teaching the natives of Wainwright.

## PICKED UP ON OUTBOARD TRIP

KETCHIKAN, June 3.—An attempt to make a Juneau to Seattle voyage in a small open boat with an outboard motor by Raymond Haines was halted at 9:30 yesterday when the engine's crank case broke after a run of two hours from this city. Haines was picked up by a tug and transferred to the coast guard Cygen, which took him and his boat here. Haines plans to return to Juneau and start from there on a second attempt.

## VANCOUVER TO HAZELTON IN A FORD SEDAN

Rev. T. H. Wright Tells of Enjoyable Trip Through the Country

HAZELTON, June 4.—Rev. T. H. Wright, B.A., United Church minister at Hazelton, and secretary of the Prince Rupert Presbytery, returned Saturday from Vancouver, where he had been attending the annual conference.

Mr. Wright motored the entire distance, taking Rev. A. A. and Mrs. Burnett and their son, Allister, to Kispix, where Mr. Burnett is minister to the Indians. Mr. Burnett purchased a car in Vancouver, and as he was not an expert driver he prevailed upon Mr. Wright to drive the car home. Mr. Wright motored the entire distance.

The journey was made by easy stages, as visits were made at some of the beauty spots and time was taken to renew acquaintances of former years. At Sardis, the Coqualeetza Indian School was visited. Rev. G. H. Raley is principal. At Ashcroft, Mr. Wright met a number of the old-timers and received a cordial welcome. Hope, Lytton, Ashcroft, 150 Mile House, Quesnel, Prince George, Vanderhoof, Fort Fraser, Burns Lake, Topley, Telqua and Smithers were the chief towns where brief visits were made.

Fairly good progress was made as far as Prince George. After leaving Prince George the travelling was very slow, owing to the slimy condition of the roads caused by recent heavy rains, until Smithers was reached. From Smithers to Hazelton the new cut-off was a vast improvement over last year.

There were large gangs of men with steam shovels widening out the road and straightening many very sharp curves at different sections of the great northern scenic route. After the roads are gravelled there will not be the same danger to motorists which exists now after every shower of rain. At all the principal points en route, the territory is covered by ministers of the United Church, all of whom are rendering splendid service to community interests.

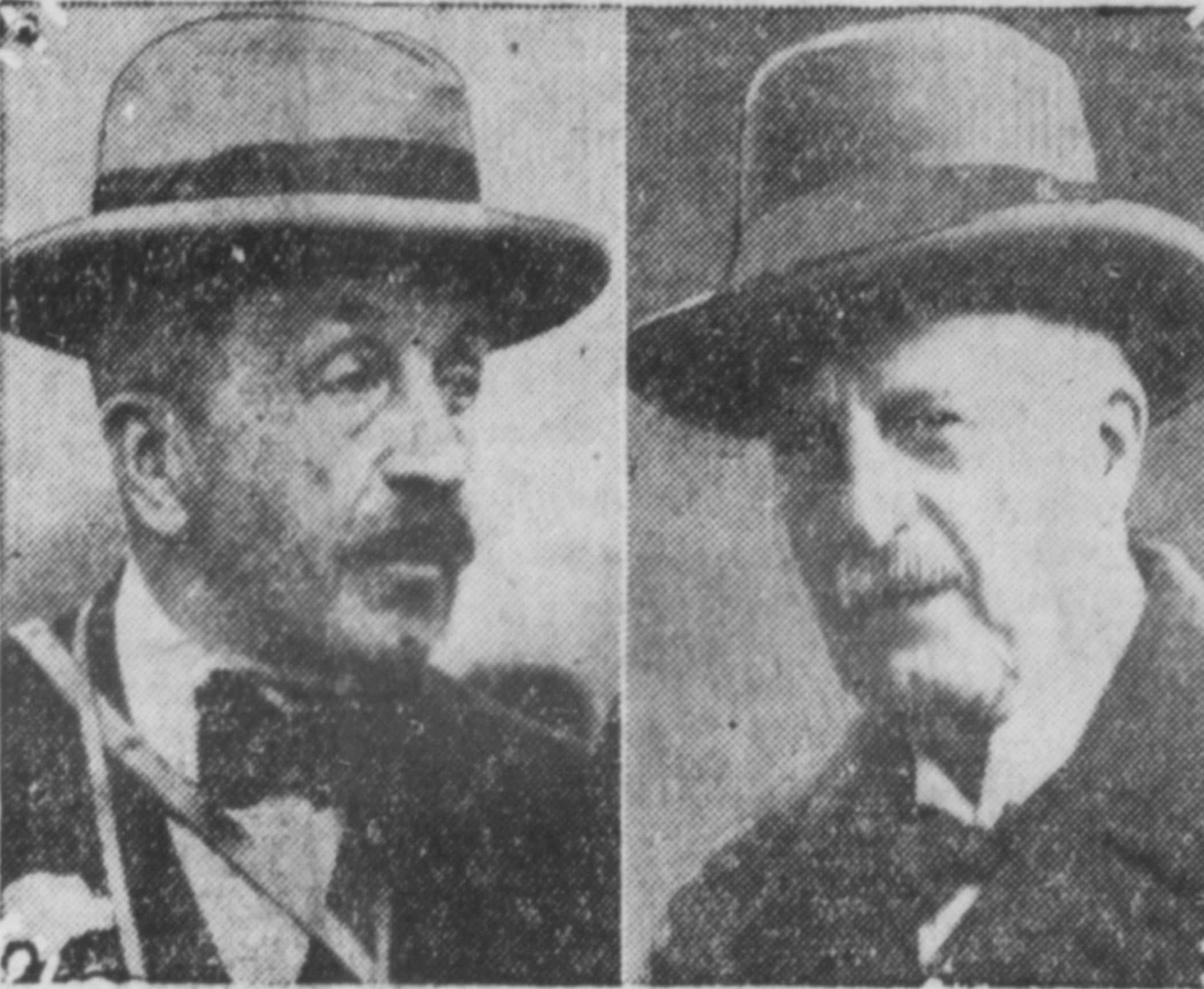

## EARTHQUAKE CAUSED WRECK

New Rock Shown on Charts Where Aleutian Struck in Uyak Bay

SEATTLE, June 4.—A submarine earthquake upheaval in the floor of Uyak Bay, Kodiak Island, was yesterday blamed for the loss of the steamer Aleutian on May 26. At the investigation it was shown that the Aleutian struck a rock where the charts show a depth of from 168 to 294 feet.

Dr. C. Marius Barbeau of the archaeological department of the federal government, arrived in the city on yesterday afternoon's train from Ottawa. Dr. Barbeau, who has been here before, will make certain investigations in this district into aboriginal history.

## SHRINE PARTIES TO VISIT CITY

Philadelphia and Buffalo Nobles to Be Here on Friday June 14

Two parties of Eastern Shriners, due here on June 14, will be the first large tourist groups of the season to visit Prince Rupert.

Ninety members of Lulu Shrine Temple, Philadelphia, will arrive in the city from the south on the steamer Prince Rupert on Friday morning, June 14, and proceed east by special train at 2 o'clock the same afternoon after enjoying a fish dinner at the Commodore Cafe.

One hundred and forty members of Ismailia Temple, Buffalo, will arrive on the same boat and leave soon after arrival for the east by special train.

Passenger representatives of the Canadian National Railways will accompany both groups which will be returning home after attending the Imperial Shrine convention in Los Angeles.

## ALMOST WIPED OUT FAMILY

MOOSOMIN, Sask., June 4.—Ernest Startin, 21 years of age, of the Iona district, south of here, believed to be mentally deranged, on Saturday shot his mother dead, shot his father, Philip Startin, who died today, and then committed suicide. A brother, Philip Startin Jr., who was shot in the arm, is recovering.

## King George has Sent for Ramsay Macdonald Who will be Premier

Stanley Baldwin's Resignation Is Accepted by His Majesty; Woman Will Likely Hold Cabinet Position in Labor Ranks

LONDON, June 4.—Stanley Baldwin resigned as premier today, handing his resignation at noon to King George, who lay ill in bed at Windsor Castle. The resignation was accepted and the King immediately sent for Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay Macdonald, preliminary to asking him to form a cabinet.

Labor men are confident Mr. Macdonald will have no difficulty in forming a Government and it is rumored his name is all but completed.

It is likely the new ministry will contain a woman cabinet minister for the first time in British history. Both Miss Susan Lawrence and Miss Margaret Bondfield are mentioned in connection with the ministry of health.

## FRASER RIVER SALMON TREATY IS WITHDRAWN

Bennett Commends Government for Giving Time to Think Over Matter

## TOLMIE ASKS ACTION

OTTAWA, June 4.—The treaty between Canada and United States designed to conserve the sockeye salmon fisheries of the Fraser River will not be ratified by the Canadian Parliament this session, it was announced by Premier Mackenzie King in the House of Commons today. He referred to the fact that considerable difference of opinion seemed to exist with regard to the treaty in the marine and fisheries committee of the House of Commons.

The premier explained that the treaty had been undertaken almost entirely in the interests of British Columbia. Opposition came largely from British Columbia members on the opposition side. This influenced the Government in its decision.

Premier Tolmie had telegraphed an urgent request for its ratification. The entire fishing industry of British Columbia supported it. "The premier's conclusion appears to be a sound one," said Hon. R. B. Bennett. He thought everybody would be grateful for the opportunity to think the treaty over.

## PRINCE RUPERT FIRE DISTRICT ONLY ONE THAT IS NOT SAFE

VICTORIA, June 4.—Conditions are safe except in the interior of the Prince Rupert district, where dry windy conditions prevail, says the week's report of the forestry department. There have been 360 fires this season in the province compared with 219 in the same period in 1928.

Having been delayed by waiting for the tide in the Naas River this morning, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 2:45 this afternoon from Anyox, Stewart and other northern points of call and will sail at 3:30 p.m. for Vancouver.

## MONTREAL TO GET TERMINAL

Fifty Million Dollars Voted For Purpose Today in House of Commons

OTTAWA, June 4.—Moved by Hon. R. B. Bennett, an amendment to the 50,000 expenditure bill for construction of the Canadian National Railways terminal in Montreal was defeated without a division in the House of Commons today. The bill was given a third reading.

The Bennett amendment suggested the referring back of the bill to a committee of the whole with instructions for an addition that the act should come into force after approval of the plan and works by the Board of Railway Commissioners.

## AMPHIBIAN IS ON WAY SOUTH

CORDOVA, June 4.—The Gorst amphibian plane Alaska was safe here when reported missing yesterday, but left later in the day on the first trip ever made across the Gulf of Alaska from the north. The plane planned to stop overnight at Ketchikan after stops at Yakutat and Juneau. Today stops are scheduled for Butedale and Alert Bay before reaching Seattle this afternoon.

OAKLAND, June 4.—Governor Parks of Alaska arrived here at 9:15 last night by air from Juneau.
