


Losers and Winners in Ryder Cup Golf Contest, England, Week-End

Fighting in the western sector saw the St. Louis Browns continue their mad pace as the two National favorites fell before the so-called underdogs. The Cincinnati Reds, conceded to be as far under as possible for the dogs to get, left Chicago reeling under a 17 to 12 blow at Redland.

PROMINENT FIGURES IN SPORT

JOHN PETER (HANS) WAGNER

One of the Greatest Ball Players

"One of the greatest ball players of all time and also one of the most popular, John P. (Hans) Wagner, thrilled the fans throughout the National League circuit with brilliant batting, fielding and base running during his major league career of 21 years with the Pittsburgh Pirates. His modesty, good nature and even disposition are such as umpires and league officials desire in every player and his relations with his employer, Barney Dreyfuss, never caused the latter a moment's worry. He led the National League for several seasons in batting, fielding and base running.

Wagner's first professional baseball job was with Steubenville, Ohio, in the Interstate League when he was paid \$85 a month. The next year he was getting \$90 from the Paterson Club of the Atlantic League. He began with the Louisville Club of the old National League in 1897 and stayed with Barney Dreyfuss when the latter got his Pittsburgh franchise in 1906. He was one of the strongest and most intelligent baseball players in the major leagues. One of the proudest feats of his career was his first home run off Christy Mathewson on August 16, 1913. He

shunned publicity. "Honus" or "The Flying Dutchman" as you like, was born at Carnegie, Pennsylvania, February 24, 1874. About the time he began to earn his livelihood as a barber he manifested his interest in baseball as an amateur player. Since his retirement from baseball in 1917 he has conducted a sporting goods store in Pittsburgh and manages amateur teams as a pastime, often taking part in the games. He also continues his interest in big league baseball and often goes to Forbes Field to renew acquaintances and make new friends with younger players whose ideal he is.
