### MUCH HALIBUT WAS OFFERED

Two Large Schooners Took Catches to Seattle Expecting Better Prices

There was another heavy day's business on the local fish exchange this morning when a total of 302,500 pounds was sold, not including the catches of two American vessels which proceeded to Seattle with 100,000 pounds and one Canadian boat which held over until tomorrow with 2500 pounds. Prices remained at about the same level as has prevailed for the past week or so, American fish receiving up to 12.9c and 6c and Canadian as high as 10.9c and 5c.
