Although the gale subsided on Sunday night, the weather bureau predicted that 1929 would probably pass out equal-

ly boisterously. A woman and her daughter were killed and four others were severely injured in Manchester at the height of yesterday's gale when a house was wrecked.

Rain greatly increased the finale in some districts, particularly in North Wales where the River Dee went out of its hanks and swamped a large area. Many sheep were drowned and roads were submarged for three feet. Damage along the shore was heavy.
