Dr. J. Knox Wright Tells of the Development in China and Korea.

Last night in the Methodist Church Hall, Dr. J. Knox Wright, travelling secretary for the Canadian Bible Society, gave a very interesting lecture on China and Korea. The many views with which the lecturer illustrated his address left a vivid impression of what the countries looked like. Many were present to hear the lecture and after the meeting expressed their thanks to Dr. Wright for the fine educational entertainment.

The whole trend of the speak-Her's remarks was to show the marked progress of unity among the churches in foreign lands. Everywhere Christianity was replacing the older Chinese and Korean religions. Theological colleges are carried on there with marked success and one of the great aims of the missions for the present is to train up native missionaries who can go and preach to the people from their own wonderful experience.

At the conclusion Dr. Wright was given a hearty vote of thanks and replied by giving some of the data of the work of the Bible Society and how it had turned out Bibles in 511 languages and was adding an additional one every seven weeks.

Last year's officers of the Bible Society were re-elected for the ensuing term and it was urged that greater action be now taken than in former years. Dr. H. R. Grant is president, all members of the Ministerial Association are "ex-officio" vice-presidents, C.C. Perry, secretary, and Judge Young

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to

Pre-emption new confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres.

before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 8 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, be-cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of im-provement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent resi-dence may be issued, provided appli-cant makes improvements to extent of \$800 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence

of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include

payment of stumpage. Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made re-

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August

4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, in-terest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original par cel, purchase price due and taxes may distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING. Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up
